SPRINGFIELD

FIRST SPAN OF BRIDGE
 FINISHED NEXT WEEK

Springfield, Aug. 4.—The first of
 the three spans of the big P. E. & E.
 bridge will be completed next week
 and the false work will be removed.
 The work on the bridge is going
 ahead at a remarkable speed and the
 matter of a day or two means a large
 portion of the bridge. The top
 "corridors" the big wooden pieces that
 were built up and fitted off the
 bridge, the same as went on the bot-
 tom, were placed in position today.
 The angle blocks, that is, the big
 12x14 timbers that brace the top and
 bottom cords, and the big two-inch
 bolts 24 feet long will be placed to-
 morrow. The work of building up
 four more timbers, or cords, will also
 begin at once in preparation for the
 next span. Contractor Roney's ex-
 pression, "I like to see things move
 along," is characteristic of the speed
 with which he puts up the big bridge.
 Even if it is not completed by the
 time of the celebration is held, two
 weeks from now, the visitors will
 have a good idea of what it is like
 when completed.

SAWDUST FIRE
 STILL GIVES TROUBLE

Springfield, Aug. 4.—Another saw-
 dust fire last evening about 8 o'clock
 threatened to do considerable dam-
 age and kept several firemen busy
 for an hour and a half. J. J. Dow-
 man, who was hired by the city to
 watch the pile of sawdust near the
 bridges, after staying on the ground
 a couple of days was turned over,
 thinking that danger of fire was over,
 for no signs of it could be found.
 Again last evening J. P. Casteel was
 coming past a little before 8 o'clock
 and saw the pile aflame. He at once
 hurried to find help. He met Fire
 Chief Clark and rather than turn in
 an alarm the two, with the help of
 J. S. Jordan, worked to put it out
 alone with buckets of water brought
 from the mill race. It was difficult
 work for the three men and was done
 to avoid calling out the department
 the ninth time for the same fire.

COMMITTEES WORK
 HARD FOR CELEBRATION

Springfield, Aug. 4.—The celebra-
 tion committees are working hard on
 the details of the big event and the
 complete program can soon be an-
 nounced. All the committees met
 Tuesday night with the general com-
 mittee and were assigned their re-
 spective duties. The committees are
 now meeting by themselves and mak-
 ing reports of their work. One diffi-
 culty that is being looked forward to
 is the matter of accommodations for
 the visitors during the three days of
 celebrating. Springfield's hotel ca-
 pacity is taxed to the limit with the
 ordinary travel, and it will be neces-
 sary to place many of the visitors in
 private homes. The entertainment
 committee will make a canvass in a
 few days of every house in the city,
 and it is thought that sufficient ac-
 commodation can be obtained. The
 illumination during the carnival has
 not been definitely decided upon by
 that committee, but they are plan-

ning a number of extra stringers of
 incandescents for Main street.

The walls of the New Rivett con-
 crete building have been completed
 and the carpenters are placing the
 roof.

BOY RUN OVER

BY TRAIN NEAR

HARRISBURG, KILLED

Rushie Lafargue, 18 Years
 Old, of San Rafael, Cal.,
 Was the Victim

Rushie Lafargue, an 18-year-old
 boy, heading his way on a freight
 train, No. 222, Conductor Hearn's
 train, running between Junction and
 Albany, yesterday, fell from a truck
 rod just as the train was leaving
 from Harrisburg, under the wheels,
 and his two legs were cut off above
 the knees. The train was not going
 over five miles an hour. The train
 was stopped, the boy who had been
 stealing a ride was picked up and
 Dr. Dale sent for. The flow of
 blood was stopped, the unfortunate
 youth put on a stretcher and brought
 to Albany on No. 16 and placed in
 St. Mary's hospital. Dr. Kavanagh
 attended Dr. Dale and dressed the
 limbs. The boy was unable to stand
 the shock and died at 8:15.

The boy was a son of John Lafar-
 gue of San Rafael, Cal., who has been
 notified. He was starting out to see
 the world and was heading his way
 north by the breakbeam route, or
 any way possible, when the accident
 happened.

This was the boy's first trip out
 into the world. He started with some
 money, but his traveling companions
 had absorbed all of it. He was with
 a couple much older men. At Junct-
 ion they were driven from the train,
 but got back on again. Lafargue
 said the brakeman wanted a dollar,
 but they didn't have it. At Harris-
 burg the brakeman again drove them
 off. A companion got off and Lafar-
 gue tried to, but slipped and fell
 under the wheels.

Coroner Fortmiller investigated the
 matter thoroughly, and decided the
 case did not call for a jury.—Albany
 Democrat.
