FORMER CHAMP GIVES REASONS FOR WALLOPING

Altitude, Water and Stupor Aid in Downfall, Boilermaker Tells His Friends

Milwaukee, Wis., Aug. 6.—"You can say for me when you return East that never again will I enter the ring to battle for the world's title, or any other title." The above remark was made to T. S. Andrews of this city at Jeffries' home in Los Angeles a few days ago. The remark by Jeff was in answer to many reports that the big fellow was not satisfied with the result of his battle with Johnson and would demand another chance at the title.

Here is another bit of information that has not been given to the public as yet. On July 13, when leaving Los Angeles, Jeffries still was bothered with a numbness on the right side of his face; in fact, the entire right side from the eye to his chin was paralyzed. He had no feeling in it, whatever, and to prove what he said he invited Andrews to pinch the face and run a needle or such into it. His gums were also affected the same way. Jeff's left eye, which was hurt in the second round at Reno, was considerably better, but even at this late day it bothered Jeff whenever he turned suddenly and the vision was not perfect. From the above it is evident that when Johnson hit Jeff over the left eye in the second round he injured the optic nerve severely, and the continued rain of blows to his cheek and jaw afterward caused a sort of paralysis of the left side of the face. According to the doctor, Jeff will be troubled with the feeling for some time and careful massage will be necessary to relieve him.

Jeffries Tells of Defeat. There have been all kinds of rumors since the battle at Reno as to the cause of Jeff's poor showing, etc., but the following statement by Jeff himself after he had recovered from the shock no doubt will be interesting. Regarding the mill Jeffries said to Andrews:

"Up to this time I hardly have known my own mind. I was in a dazed sort of way, a kind of stupor, and could not come out of it. It is all past and gone and that's what makes me feel so bad. There is no use trying to offer excuses, for people do not care to hear them, but they might as well know the truth. I am sorry about the friends who bet on me and lost, but I had known the real condition I was in I never would have permitted them to go ahead—I did not realize it until too late to help them.

"Had the fight taken place two weeks earlier I do not think Mr. Johnson would have the crowd today. At Roundsmann I was on edge and as fit as a man could be and only waited the tap of the song. I then had started to ease off in my work and did not look for any setback up to July 4. However, when the report came that Governor Gillett had ordered it stopped it upset me and in fact, all the boys. Then when I finally was allowed to Reno all my plans were knocked out. After locating at Moana Springs I did not feel the same.

Altitude and Water Bad. "The altitude and water affected me no doubt and I now am positive that the altitude had much to do with making me lousy and out of sort. To add to this I had a bad attack of dysentery a few days before the fight and that was the real reason I could not box more. It weakened me, but I stopped it the day before the fight and thought I was alright again. In this I was fooled, for I was not right, although I did not fully realize it until in the ring. Still worse was the fact that I was nervous and fretted, which the doctors tell me now was nothing more or less than a nervous breakdown.

"When I entered the arena my legs appeared heavy and there seemed to be no strength in my arms. It was then that I first realized by condition, but I had determined to win at any cost and felt confident I would. In the first round I felt I could not work right. I said to myself that I would be alright in a few rounds and would then sail in and mix matters. When I received the blow on the left eye in the second round the fight was lost for the optic nerve no doubt was injured. The eye began swelling and I could not see at all out of it, but that would not have been so bad if it had not been for the fact that I saw two men in front of me all the time and could not tell where to hit nor how to hit. I simply saw double. I told my seconds about it and they worked on the eye, but could not help it any.

Saw Defeat Ahead of Him. "As the fight progressed it became more apparent to me that I could not win, for my inability to judge distance or time my blows showed me only too plainly where the trouble was. I simply fought in a mechanical way and only remember landing one stiff blow. That was in the ninth or eleventh round, when I reached his jaw with my left and jarred him. Aside from this it all appeared as a dream and I could not recall the fifteenth round when I went down. I was all in and only feel sorry that I put up such a poor contest.

"I want to say that Johnson while being champion and a splendid fighter is not as good as many imagine. He is not so hard to hit. I had any number of openings to get him, but simply could not judge the distance and had no strength to back it up. Two weeks before I would have bet my last dollar that I would have

beaten him. He won, however, so give him credit. I am through for all time with the ring."

CORNELL SAYS

JEFF WAS DOPED

San Francisco, Aug. 6.—Roger Cornell, who trained Jeffries, said that he believed Jeffries had been drugged before his fight with Johnson. He said:

"I, for one, think that Jeffries was given an East Indian drug on Saturday before the fight. That afternoon Jeffries went fishing and did not return until 10 o'clock. He wouldn't let any of the trainers accompany him but always took some friends, and you know what that means. I noticed the change on Sunday and more so Monday noon, when I became convinced that Jeffries was a wreck. He acted like a child, doing everything requested of him, something he would never have done before without an argument."

SOME CLASS TO

JOHNSON'S SELECTION OF RESIDENCE PLACE

New York, Aug. 6.—Residents of Brooklyn Heights, an exclusive section where many wealthy New Yorkers have their homes, are in a turmoil over the announcement that Jack Johnson, the negro pugilist, is negotiating for the purchase of a house in their midst.

According to the real estate men the deal was to have been closed yesterday, but Johnson was unexpectedly summoned to Chicago on account of an accident which befell his brother.

The price agreed upon is given as \$62,500. The house is a three-story structure, is of pressed brick and stone, beautifully decorated and covered with ivy.

Johnson announced that he intends to maintain the house "in a style corresponding to the prevailing fashion in Brooklyn's exclusive social community."

One of his nearest neighbors will be the Rev. Newell Dwight Hillis, successor to Henry Ward Beecher in the pastorate of the Plymouth Congregational church. Two justices of the state supreme court also live within a stone's throw, together with a score or more of millionaire bankers, lawyers and business men.

Spokane, Wash., Aug. 5.—And now comes the "spit ball" in tennis. H. E. Callahan, a local player, who has not lost a single set this season, and C. E. Cole and Callahan have been winning all kinds of trophies and side bets from numerous experts in Spokane the last three months, and up to date no other pair has taken down even as much as a package of chewing gum.

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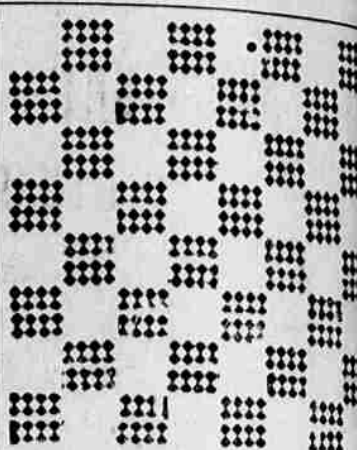
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
