**SIX MILES OF CITY
 WATER PIPE LAID
 FOR COTTAGE GROVE**

By the close of the present week
 the American Light & Water com-
 pany will have finished laying six
 miles of pipe for the new \$100,000
 mountain water system now under
 construction. This stretch is from
 the intake on Laying creek toward
 Cottage Grove, and is the most diffi-
 cult to build, the cuts being heavy
 in several points, with large boulders
 in the trenches. It has been impossi-
 ble to make the cuts other than by
 shoveling, where the men of the re-
 maining work can be done with teams
 and scrapers. There is still a con-
 siderable distance the other side of
 Dorena to ditch in order to connect
 with the work now being done at
 that place.

Will Return to Montana.

**NO PASSENGERS
 ON THE WRECKED
 STEAMER DROWNED**

Everybody Rescued and Safely
 Landed by Ship's
 Crew

Seattle, Aug. 6.—There was no
 panic when the Princess May struck
 the reef yesterday, but the women
 and children suffered much from cold
 in the small boats, the majority hav-
 ing left the sinking ship scantily clad.
 Captain McLeod and his officers
 took the situation coolly and man-
 aged to get all the passengers and
 crew away from the sinking steamer
 before she foundered. The boats
 hugged the shore until daylight, when
 landings were made.

In the meantime steamers were sent
 from Juneau, where the distress sig-
 nals were received from several
 sources. The steamer Victoria
 picked up the call at sea and it was
 also heard by the United States naval
 station at Cordova. Canadian post-
 office officials here believe that a
 shipment of gold from Dawson for
 Seattle went down with the vessel.

A boat's crew of six was picked up
 by a fishing launch and brought to
 Juneau. Later a second boat's crew,
 with Pilot Richardson, arrived. The
 members of the crew who are here
 say that the steamship will be a total
 loss, the bottom being torn open so
 that it will be impossible to raise
 the vessel. Captain McLeod and a
 number of the crew will stand by the
 ship.
