THE WORLD OF WORLDS

There's many a man and many a dame defeated in this worldly game, who might regain the upward track (for has-beens now and then come back). If we would do instead of preach! A lot of hearts bowed with woe would feel a new and cheering glow. How well we like to wag our jaws to help some worthy cause, and how we hate to bend our backs and get right down to old brass tacks! Oh, for a thousand tongues," we sigh, "to lecture poor folks passing by; to show them where they've made mistakes, and forty kinds of dizzy breaks; to hand them precepts by the peck, and fill them up, clear to the neck, and fill them up, clear to the neck, with admonition and advice, and solemn warnings, off the ice." A thousand tongues we each might use, to air our philanthropic views, but when it came to helpful deed, one finger would be all we'd need.

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ANOTHER GOVERNMENT RAILWAY

One hears much of the Cape-to-Cairo railway and the Trans-Siberian Railway, but the Trans-Asian Railway, recently completed by the Russian government, marks the end of one of the most important of strategic railways in the world, says an exchange.

The Central Asian Railway extends about half way across the continent of Asia, over "the roof of the world," and through one of the oldest-settled portions of that continent. A scientific commission from the Carnegie institution at Washington, which spent two years among the ruins and the deserts of Qhiva and Kzil-kum and through the oases of Merv, Bokhara and Samarkand, estimate from the archaeological evidences that this section of the earth's surface has been inhabited by human beings for at least 10,000 years, and that several "cultures," or periods of civilization have succeeded each other, each with its own individuality.

The principal cities along the line are Ashkhabad, which is the capital of the Russian province of Trans-Caspia; Merv, which is surrounded by twenty square miles of ruins; Charijui, Bokhara, Samarkand, Kokand, Andijan and Tashkend. There are altogether eighty-five stations, but most of them are for the convenience of the railway management rather than for the accommodation of the public.

In 1873 Ferdinand de Lesseps submitted to Emperor Alexander II the details of a line from Moscow to Calcutta, a distance of about 5000 miles, that portion which lay west of India to be built by Russia, and the remainder by England. DeLesseps formed a company with French capital to undertake the preliminary surveys, and the Russian government gave him a concession for six years while he unfolded the scheme, with the promise of a permanent charter and a liberal guarantee. But the British government declined to concur in the project, and when the French engineers reached the frontier of Afghanistan they were prohibited from proceeding and returned to Europe. After a prolonged controversy DeLesseps abandoned the project and transferred his attention to the Panama canal, which also failed in realization. Now both projects are realities. Dreams rarely come true in the day of the dreamer.

DIMMED LUSTRE OF GREECE

One good story comes out of Reno which is continental in its interest and which is bringing tears to the eyes classically inclined and grins to the faces of pugilistic promoters, says the Butte News.

An entire carload of students and tutors from Eastern universities was enroute to California to be the guests of the students of Berkeley University. There in the great Greek amphitheatre, resembling much the ruined Coliseum of Rome, "Antigone" was to be presented in the Greek tongue.

How the shade of Sophocles must have smiled, if shades can only smile, at such fidelity to his work and art. Fancy Americans traveling further than Alexander held sway. It was a journey such as Caesar never made, and the incursions of Cyrus into Ancient Egypt were trivial by comparison.

But stay, the students passed by Reno. As they came nearer and nearer their contempt for the brutal contest lessened, and interest grew keen. They compared it to the gladiatorial contests of Rome and achievements of Olympia.

By the time Reno was reached they had voted to a man to have their car switched into the "arena siding" and to let the Greek play at Berkeley go hang.

Greek plays and Greek plays we may have, but another fight of a century—never. Homer sang of fights, and scribes and poets have gloried in the martyrdom of Thermopylae. Holy Writ has no more interesting tale than that in which David's sling shot bounced a rock off Goliath's cranium and sent him eternally to the mat. History is virile by its battles from the route of Xerxes, to the triumph of Bruce at Bannockburn, the fall of the Corsican at Waterloo or the glory of Bunker Hill.

So reasoned the spectacled savants from the halls of learning; whereupon they ditched the Berkeley attraction and watched the "dinge" play ping pong with the giant boilermaker.

And the glory that once belonged to Greece was dimmed.

There is a deeper issue at stake in this assembly proposition than the mere selection or suggestion of candidates—or the personal merits of the men so chosen—and that is the integrity

of the Republican party, says the Coos Bay Daily Times (Rep.). The party will always have its own corrective work to do. A popular institution such as the great dominant American party will always find within itself both men and measures that are unworthy, and the task of eliminating the bad and correcting the erroneous, will always be part of its duties. But the party can do this, and has always done it, without the necessity of any disruptive, reformatory faction which sets itself up for that purpose as the assembly leaders have done. The assembly element in Coos county is made up of some very excellent citizens who are Republicans, but who have been led astray by the hue and cry of the Portland machine for party organization. These men, excellent and worthy though they may be, are not representative of the rank and file of the Republican party in Coos county. The call which these men issued was written in Portland, and was so lacking in the elements that make for popular approval that it was ignored by the Republicans generally. Necessary as they may be, leaders alone do not constitute a party.

Next Monday night should be an epoch-making occasion in Eugene. The granting of a franchise to Hill's Oregon Electric Railway, with a bond to insure its completion into this city within eighteen months, means great things for Eugene and the entire upper Willamette valley.

The Lane County Asset Company is rapidly getting its affairs in shape for the beginning of construction work, and it is more than likely that a good start will be made on a railroad to the coast before the fall season is over.
