HARVEY W. SCOTT DIES AFTER AN OPERATION

Editor of Oregonian Had Weak Heart and Could Not Survive

Baltimore, Aug. 7.—Harvey W. Scott, editor of the Portland Oregonian, died in Johns Hopkins hospital today shortly before 6 p. m. of heart failure, 22 hours after a surgical operation for prostatectomy. He was aged 72 years.

He went off the operating table Saturday morning in strong condition. This morning at 7 o'clock he began sinking and in spite of the best stimulants known to medical science his heart grew steadily weaker until the last and the end was painful.

With him were his wife and one of his sons, Leslie Scott, who had accompanied him on his trip to this city for surgical relief.

In Portland Mr. Scott leaves two sons, John H. and Ambrose B., and one daughter, Miss Judith. Mr. Scott began failing nearly three months ago from an attack of sciatica. Early in June he went to Hot Lake, eastern Oregon, but the baths there greatly debilitated him. At last convinced that only surgery could relieve him, he started for Johns Hopkins hospital, from Portland, one week ago this Saturday morning.

The operation was pronounced entirely successful and the surgeons and physicians were confident of recovery up to this morning, when an unexpected weakness of the heart ensued which the physicians were powerless to cope with.

Mr. Scott was apparently as strong on arriving here last Monday as when leaving Portland four and one-half days before. The doctors here perceived his heart weakness, but thought he could go safely through the operation and its subsequent effects. At Mr. Scott's request the operation was performed Saturday instead of Monday.

SUNDAY LID IS

OFF IN IDAHO

Boise, Idaho, Aug. 8.—For the first time in three years Idaho cities and towns were run wide open yesterday, so far as public amusements are concerned. It was the first Sunday since the supreme court of the state held that a scenic railway and other forms of amusement, that are not immoral, dangerous or detrimental to public health are permissible under the rest law.

The ruling was made in the test case of the state vs. the Natatorium Amusement company, on habeas corpus proceedings to release G. W. Hill, manager. So confident are the theater managers, operators of moving picture shows, music halls and those who conduct amusement parks that the supreme court had lifted the lid off of public Sunday entertainments through this decision, they threw their places of business wide open yesterday.

This was generally true all over the state. There has been and is strong opposition to the Sunday rest law and general sentiment is against it. If the authorities do not act it will hereafter become a dead letter on the statute books.

EDWARD'S FUNERAL COST \$25,000 MORE THAN DID VICTORIA'S

London, Aug. 8.—The returned \$202,500 as the cost of the late king's funeral shows an increase of \$25,000 over that of Queen Victoria, the expense of which was \$197,500. But the fitting up of Westminster hall for the lying in state of Edward VII. cost \$19,000, and the expenditure included an admiralty charge of \$19,000 for the traveling and subsistence of naval officers and men. Neither of these items were incurred at the funeral of Queen Victoria, when also the sundry expenses amounted to only \$2500 as against \$12,500 last May.

Compared with other great state obsequies those of the late king cost not a fifth of Emperor William's in 1888, the expense of which was \$430,000 to the city of Berlin alone and \$50,000 to the imperial treasury. The great Duke of Wellington's funeral cost \$500,000, that of Nelson \$250,000, William IV's \$80,000, and the prince consort's only \$30,000.

TRAIL SOON TO BE COMPLETED

We learn from C. H. Young that the government trail from Florence to Alsea will be finished about the middle of this month. The distance is about 12 miles. Watering troughs are being put up at several of the springs along the route for the convenience of travelers who may wander that way. It is the intention later on to put up guide boards wherever needed and mile posts all along the way. A trail is also being opened north of the Alsea, which will make a direct route from Florence over the hills to Toledo.—Florence West.
