SPORTING NEWS

NIP AND TUCK RACE BETWEEN FOUR TEAMS IN COAST LEAGUE

First place in the Coast league race
 has changed hands 23 times in less
 than 19 weeks of scheduled play, and
 the race is still so close that undoubt-
 edly there will be several more shifts
 before the pennant winner gets out
 in the lead to stay.

San Francisco, which holds the lead
 now, has had the greatest hold on
 the job, for it has been in first place
 12 times for a total of 54 days. On
 five different occasions the Seals have
 had the lead for a single day, only
 to slip back.

Portland ranks third now, but
 ought to have second call on first
 place, because the Beavers have held
 it 11 times for a total of 38 days.
 Four times the Beavers have been up
 for a single day, and they have never
 dropped below fourth place. Twice
 early in the season they were down
 for a single day and then on the last
 trip south the clubs were so bunched
 that in one day Portland dropped
 from first to fourth place and stayed
 there five days.

Oakland has been in first place
 three times, twice for a day each and
 once for two days. Vernon made the
 getaway in the lead the first week
 and has been back there three times
 since. Los Angeles has never been
 higher than second place and enjoyed
 that altitude for a single day. The
 Angels started off in last place and
 have held fifth most of the time.
 Since May 1, Sacramento has not got-
 ten its head above the cellar, and
 it had a breathing spell only for a
 single day at that time.

JOHNSON WON'T BUY IN SWELL DISTRICT

New York, Aug. 8.—The feeling of
 residents of the exclusive section of
 Brooklyn Heights were a little re-
 lieved today when they read that
 Jack Johnson, the negro pugilist, had
 declared that he did not want to buy
 any property where he was not wel-
 come.

Edward M. Gillespie, the real es-

tate broker, who has charge of the
 property, admitted today that there
 was little chance of Johnson getting
 the property now, but by Wednesday
 the house and lot would be sold and
 there was a chance that a negro
 might be the buyer.

As to the identity of the negro, the
 real estate dealer refused to make
 any statement.

When seen in Chicago, Johnson
 said that he was anxious to put some
 of the \$100,000 he had in real estate
 and believed that property was the
 best of all investments. He said:

"No rubbing of shoulders with me.
 Right living is my motto. I treat
 everybody squarely and I wouldn't
 lower myself by joining the ranks of
 most of the so-called aristocracy who
 are always getting in the public eye,
 mostly in a bad way."

RIFLE SHOOT BEGINS AT CAMP PERRY

Camp Perry, O., Aug. 8.—With
 the gathering today of Buckeye
 marksmen, Camp Perry became a
 scene of animated activity, and for
 eighteen days to come the crack of
 the rifle will sound unceasingly.
 Following the annual competitions of
 the Ohio State Militia and Rifle as-
 sociation, the eighth annual matches
 of the National Board for the Promo-
 tion of Rifle Practice and the Twen-
 ty-eighth annual tournament of the
 National Rifle association of Ameri-
 ca will be held here.

Among the principal events to be
 decided at this year's tournament are
 the famous Herriek cup match, the
 Catrow cup match, the governor's
 match, police team and individual re-
 volver matches, Wimbledon and
 Leach cup matches and the national
 team, national individual and national
 pistol matches.

The Camp Perry range is finely
 equipped with 250 rifle and revolver
 targets, all arranged to the north so
 that they can be shot from a common
 firing line.

Yoman Yachtsman in Race.
 Boston, Aug. 8.—Elimination trials
 for the right to "race" against the
 Spanish sloop boats in the interna-
 tional contest next week were com-
 menced today off Marblehead. Among
 the yachts entered in the trials is the
 Wolf, of which Miss Alice Sargent of
 Brookline is the skipper. The field
 includes seventeen boats, of which
 seven are new this year. The trials

will continue three days, and three
 boats will be selected to meet the
 Spanish craft. All three boats that
 composed last year's team, which suc-
 cessfully defended the Taft cup
 against the German team, are entered
 in the trials.

Yachts of Three Nations.
 London, Aug. 8.—Yachts of three
 nations, Great Britain, France and
 Germany, are competing in the great
 international regatta commenced to-
 day at Ryde. Next year the regatta
 will be held in French waters, and in
 1912 Germany will be in charge of
 the event.

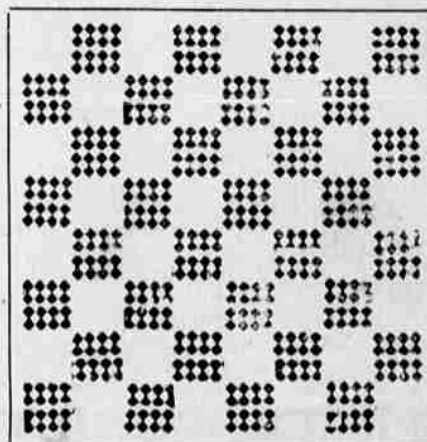
