HOPS IN ENGLAND
WILL NOT BE
HEAVY CROP
So Writes Kola Neis, the Well-Known Oregon Buyer—
Other Market
Conditions

Portland, Aug. 10.—Kola Neis, the well-known Oregon hop buyer, writes from London under date of July 27 of hop crop conditions in England as follows:

"The continued cool and rainy weather has kept back the growth of the vines and, therefore, hops have not armed out as well as expected. It is now too late for the vine to make sufficient growth to produce a heavy crop. The bine is uneven and while they look very well in some gardens, in others hops show slackness in bine.

"This summer there has been not so much washing done as usual, but there is some vermin in all districts. Since last week there has been a little increase in vermin.

"I do not think that the yield is likely to exceed 300,000 cwt. under favorable conditions. Some dealers estimate the crop at 270,000 cwt., but should unfavorable weather continue the yield will fall considerably short of this figure.

"There has been a little more business done during the last few days, but the market is not quotably higher. The unfavorable reports have the effect of checking the further decline of prices."

It was reported in the local market yesterday that John Carmichael bought the Gilbert & Patterson lot of 211 bales of 1909s at Salem at 12 1/2 cents. No surprise would be occasioned if a considerable block of spot hops were taken in the near future by exporters. There are 2500 bales or more of good export quality available. Yesterday's English cables reported the weather unsettled and the market unchanged.

Eggs Advancing. Fancy eggs are advancing and in some quarters along Front street selected stock is 1c a dozen higher, at 29c.

Receipts of eggs are fair but good quality is hard to get. To secure this, buyers are offering the premium of 1c a dozen for something they can guarantee to customers.

No change is shown in the price of ordinary quality because there is plenty of this offering. The market is full of hot weather eastern eggs and these are being sold at reduced values in order to unload more quickly. Good eastern eggs are finding a steady demand within a few fractions of what the local stuff is worth.

Some local storage eggs are being withdrawn and these are finding a good demand whenever the quality is right. As a general rule Oregon storage eggs are better this year than ever before and this alone will help the demand in that line.

Fancy Potatoes Lower. A drop of 5c per hundred pounds is shown in the price of best potatoes here. This comes as the result of increasing offerings. No southern business is possible at the moment.

Expect Good Week for Poultry. Front street trade expects a good week in the poultry market during the coming six days. All the shipments during the latter part of last week were quickly cleaned up at the higher prices quoted.

Peaches Some Lower. Peaches are down from 5c to 10c a box today in the Front street trade. While some are still asking 80c for best local Crawford's, most dealers are willing to clean up at 70c to 75c. Early peaches are selling around 60c for A's and 50c for B's.

Butter Market Very Firm. A very firm tone is shown in the local butter market and prices are firmer, although no change is generally shown. One city creamery has advanced its quotations but in most instances the same institution keeps above the general market.
