SAM TO REMOVE

OPPONENTS FIRST

Then He Figures the Colored
 Champion Must Give Him
 Chance for Title

Philadelphia, Aug. 10.—Langford
 is taking on Al Kaufman to force
 Jack Johnson to meet him, according
 to an interview given out by Joe
 Woodman, the manager of Sam Lang-
 ford. Woodman insists that it is solely
 to force Johnson to fight Langford
 that he has arranged to box
 Kaufman six rounds in this city next
 month.

"Kaufman trained with Johnson,"
 is the way Manager Woodman argues,
 "and I guess the Texan did teach
 him many of his ring tricks, but that
 does not frighten us, for we are not
 worried about Johnson himself, and
 we are certainly not afraid of his
 pupil. The real reason we are meet-
 ing Kaufman is to prevent Johnson
 from meeting him. We intend to kill
 off every opponent of the Texan's un-
 til the public forces this big Texan
 to give Langford a lick at the cham-
 pionship candy stick."

After Jack Johnson had punched
 all the fight out of Jim Jeffries he
 began to think of the next man he
 had to meet and he realized that it
 was Sam, and he immediately took
 steps to get out of that meeting if he
 could. He picked out Kaufman as the
 next heavy weight champion of the
 world. He may be right, at that, you
 never can tell. Billy Delaney told
 me that he thought that Kaufman
 would wear the title sure, but I do
 not agree with Delaney. I think it
 will be Sam who will wear that belt."

DR. ROLLER PLEADS TWO BROKEN RIBS

New York, Aug. 10.—News reached
 here today of the serious injury in
 London last night of Dr. B. F. Roller,
 the American wrestler. He broke two
 ribs in a contest with Gama, an East
 Indian wrestler whom he had chal-
 lenged for a stake of \$1000 a side.
 Gama, although at a disadvantage
 in weight and height, defeated the
 American easily, gaining the first fall
 in 1 minute and 40 seconds, and the
 second in 9 minutes and 25 seconds.

AVIATION MEET AT ASBURY PARK

Asbury Park, N. J., Aug. 10.—At
 Interlaken Field, bordering on beau-
 tiful Deal lake, the kings of the air
 are gathered together today for what
 promises to be a record-breaking
 aviation meet. Orville Wright is per-
 sonally in charge of the program,
 which will continue through ten days.
 Daily flights will be made by several
 aerial stars, including Walter Brook-
 ins, who will attempt to break his
 own record for altitude. There will
 also be an attempt to establish a
 new record for a fifty mile flight, 25
 miles to sea and back. Demonstra-
 tions of the possibilities of aeroplanes
 for military uses will be Friday's
 feature. There will also be an ama-
 teur day, when amateur flyers will be
 privileged to show what they can do
 with their machines.

MCARTHUR FILES

DECLARATION

Portland, Aug. 10.—C. N. McAr-
 thur yesterday filed his declaration
 of candidacy for state senator from
 Multnomah county, or the Thirteenth
 district, as it is known. Mr. McAr-
 thur was the choice of the recent as-
 sembly for the republican nomi-
 nation. He subscribes to the following
 slogan: "For a direct primary with
 an open assembly," and attaches this
 statement:

"I will support a sane, business-
 like and economical administration of
 public affairs and will strive to rep-
 resent my constituents honestly,
 faithfully and to the best of my abil-
 ity. I believe in the assembly as the
 best method of suggesting party can-
 didates and in the direct primary as
 the place to have them ratified or re-
 jected. I believe in the principles of
 the republican party and will vote for
 a republican for United States sena-
 tor at the session of 1913, but will
 not vote for any man whose political
 or moral record is unclear."

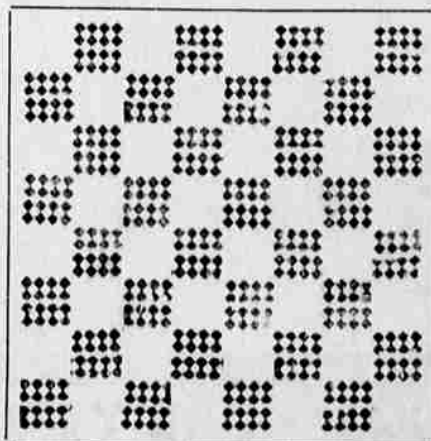
