IN THE World of Sport

MANY GOOD RACES AT STATE FAIR
 Attractive Premiums, Big Purse and Free Stunts to Be Given

Prospects for a successful state fair were never brighter, according to Secretary Frank Meredith of Salem, who was in Portland yesterday attending to state fair interests. Thirty-five thousand dollars in premiums and race purses will be offered, and there will be dozens of entertaining free attractions, such as band concerts, fireworks, vaudeville and other features. Extensive improvements have been made about the grounds, new walks, barns and other buildings having been constructed since spring.

One of the improvements consists of a model dairy house, which will be equipped with all the up-to-date devices for handling cows and dairy products, with improved stall and stanchions. Practical demonstrations will be given daily under the supervision of the dairy department of the association.

A new stock barn has just been completed. Its dimensions are 200x38 feet, and it was erected at a cost of \$2000. Bleachers have also been built south of the grandstand to accommodate 1200 people.

One new feature which has been installed, and one that will be much appreciated by visitors, is the pure water system. The water is secured from wells, and has been pumped directly into the pipes by a compressed air system.

Famous horses have been entered in the races, the two purses for \$5000 each, one for the 2:12 trot and the other for the 8:08 pace attracting the attention of fast horse owners throughout the northwest.

Facilities for reaching the grounds were never before so good. In addition to the railway facilities there will be two electric lines that will bring

visitors to the grounds. The Oregon Electric line is making new tracks and switches to facilitate the handling of the crowds.

The "camp town" which has always been one of the features of the fair, will be continued this year. "Mayor" Tozier having charge of the allotment of camping grounds, which are free. Season tickets are issued to campers.

FREE EXHIBITION OF FANCY SHOOTING

Mr. and Mrs. Adolph Topperwein of San Antonio, Texas, the celebrated marksmen, will give an exhibition of expert and fancy shooting on College Hill bordering on the new car loop, Tuesday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock. This exhibition will be well worth an effort to see, as no such marvelous shooting has ever been done in this section. It will be a revelation to all of the wonderful possibilities of modern arms and ammunition in the hands of experts. Mr. Topperwein is the acknowledged dean of fancy and trick shots, his many feats being of a highly sensational character. Mrs. Topperwein is without a peer among women in this line of work. Ladies are especially urged to come and witness her astonishing skill with shotgun, rifle and pistol. The exhibition is free.

BIDS OPENED FOR COBURG SCHOOL

Range from \$11,500 to \$15,100—Teachers Chosen and Wood Contract Let

On Saturday the Coburg school district board met at the city hall to open the bids for the district bonds, erection of a school house, purchasing wood, etc.

Regarding the bonds there was no bids submitted, although there being several inquiries concerning dates, etc. These were laid aside with instructions for the clerk to answer.

Three bids were presented concerning the construction of a school house according to the plans and specifications which were submitted by the architect and were in charge of the State Bank of Coburg. The amount of the bids were, \$11,500, \$12,985 and \$15,101.

The wood contract was let to Clyde Sidwell, he being the cheapest of several that were submitted. Geo. Smith offered to furnish 60 cords for \$230, Clyde Sidwell for \$175.00, W. Spores for \$195, and J. S. Green for \$187.

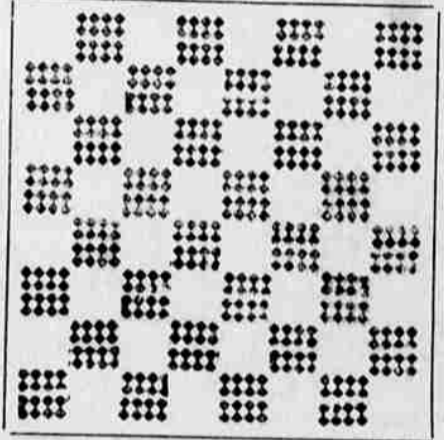
