

WEEKLY NEWS LETTER FROM AMERICA'S BIG TOWN

Guard Special Service.

New York, Aug. 13.—That American girls are the most beautiful and charming in the world, surpassing even the famed dark-eyed and raven-tressed belles Spanish America, is the opinion of Sr. Thomas Estrada Palma, Cuban ranchero and son of the late president of the Cuban republic. Nor is this mere interview flattery, as affected by visiting notables fishing for social invitations, but the expression of a conviction which will have a romantic culmination next week when the Cuban takes as his bride Miss Helen Douglas Brown, a daughter of Mr. Douglas Lester Burman-Browne, of West One Hundred and Seventh street, city.

Strangely enough, Miss Brown, although distinctly American, was born in a Spanish-American country, Mexico, while Sr. Palma, distinctly a Latin, was born in the United States, Central Valley, N. Y., was his birthplace, the elder Palma being a school teacher in that town before he returned to Cuba to resume the revolution which ended in the freedom of his country and the selection of himself as president.

We read a lot about the "students" of European countries, the press dispatches indicating that their chief activity is in rioting, demonstrating and raising the lower regions generally. Now we shall have an opportunity to see with our own eyes these strange species, and judge for ourselves whether they are human. A hundred genuine students from the University of Vienna, in black velvet jackets, white breeches, say caps on their heads and long black boots on their toes, and armed with revolvers, are on their way to America and will arrive at this port a week from tomorrow. Accompanying the cutups and sad dogs are a hundred alumni, presumably to keep them straight, and also several proud papas and mamas. All of the students are said to be there with the voice, and they will give musical concerts while on this side.

Our colored brethren of the National Negro Business league will gather in New York next week to hold their eleventh annual meeting and talk over trade prospects for the coming year. That many negroes, especially in the south, where they are supposed to be downtrodden, have made good in a business way and ac-

cumulated much filthy lucre, will be amply proven by this gathering. Dr. Booker T. Washington and many other colored men of prominence will attend, and Col. Theodore Roosevelt has promised to deliver an address. The distinguished editorial correspondent of The Outlook is now hard at work on the speeches he proposes to deliver on his tour of the west and south. Nearly all of the addresses have been dictated, but all will be carefully revised. Much significance will attach to these first formal utterances on national questions, and the former president is weighing each word carefully. It may safely be promised that his trip, beginning the latter part of this month, will be marked by a trail of verbal bombshells.

Following the "fashion show," which is now holding forth at Madison Square Garden, a national show devoted to the greatest of indoor sports, housekeeping will begin next Saturday.

A block front on Broadway, in the upper forties, will be transferred Monday to a company of out-of-town capitalists and on the site will be erected what the promoters ambitiously declare will be the largest restaurant in the whole wide world. In addition to the eating house, with a main dining room capable of seating 6000 people and several smaller rooms, the building will contain two theaters, a skating rink, several stores and automobile show rooms and upper floors devoted to offices. The announcement of these plans has caused even blase Broadway to sit up and take notice.

Theatrical field day at the Polo Grounds, an annual event of much interest to the actors and actresses, will be pulled off next Friday.

When Mr. J. Eads How, the millionaire hobo, visited New York recently, he appointed a committee on protection for the Brotherhood of the Unemployed. The members of the committee, whose duty it is to prevent the "illegal arrest" of comrades and their reroading to the island as "vags," are now desirous of resigning. As one of them put it, "How 'ell are you goin' to argue with a cup?" Mr. How himself is uncertain as to the answer to this problem, as he was recently arrested in Philadelphia, that wicked city where nobody cares, just because he attempted to make a little speech on the streets.

THE DRAMA

New York, Aug. 13.—It will be two or three weeks before the new theatrical season is well launched—perhaps longer—but the Messrs. Shubert are preparing to start the ball rolling next Monday night with Charles J. Ross in "High Life in Jail," the attraction reopening the Hackett theater. It is described as a musical farce in three acts by Walter Hackett, with lyrics by Ben Shields and music by P. D. Costa. Mr. Ross plays the role of a banker who gets into jail under such comfortable conditions that he never wants to live anywhere else. In addition to Mr. Ross the cast includes Frank Byron, Louis Langdon, Ray Cox, Elsa Ryan, Althea Francis and others. The production is being staged by William C. DeMille.

Louis Mann, having defied all traditions successfully, is now in the midst of a highly successful and prosperous engagement at the Lyric theater under the management of William A. Brady, appearing in his own three-act farce comedy, "The Cheater." This farce has turned out to be especially appropriate at the present time, as it deals with the predicament of a reformer who inherits an all-night saloon of the sort now being investigated by Mayor Gagner. "The Cheater" enjoys the distinction of being the only comedy now running without music and is voted to be the funniest thing in town.

"Life Is a Merry-Go-Round," as sung by Joseph Cawthorn in "Girlish," as a very good indication of the spirit of Frederick Thompson's big summer show at the New Amsterdam theater. The chorus of sixty is as attractive as ever, and its units continue to display an enthusiasm in their work that furnishes grounds for the belief that they enjoy the show as much as the people on the other side of the footlights.

"Reminiscence Ragtime Revue," the latest added novelty to the "Follies of 1910," at the Jardin de Paris, gives promise of being the most important feature of the entertainment. It is

made up of ragtime songs from other Ziegfeld shows.

The Criterion theater will also reopen next Monday evening under the direction of Mr. Henry B. Harris, who will present James Forbes' new comedy, "The Colimatters." Mr. Harris has engaged Orrin Johnson to create the part of Larry Brisco in the new piece.

"The Gamblers," the first of a number of plays prosecuted by the Authors' Producing company, will be brought into New York, after a short preparatory tour, for an extended engagement. "The Gamblers" is Mr. Charles Klein's latest effort.

Walter Jones, the comedian who appeared last season in "Going Some," under the management of the Messrs. Shubert, has been added to the company which is to present "The Simple Life" at the Hackett theater, which is the same as "High Life in Jail."

Another early season production will be "The Girl and the Drummer," which will be produced by the Messrs. Shubert and William A. Brady. The play is a musical version of "What Happened to Jones," with book and lyrics by George Broadhurst, author of the original, and music by Augustus Barrett.
