## GOVERNOR GIVES TROPHY CUP TO DRY FARMERS

### Washington's Executive Will Offer Prize at Dry Farming Congress

Spokane, Wash., Aug. 13.—Evidence of his faith in the modern tillage of dry farming, Governor Marion E. Hay, of Washington, offers a solid silver trophy cup, valued \$250, as the grand prize for the best state exhibit, Washington barred, at the International Dry Farming exposition in connection with the Fifth Dry Farming congress in Spokane October 3 to 6. The gift is a private one. Governor Hay is a practical farmer.

Colorado captured the state cups at the third and fourth congresses and expositions at Cheyenne, Wyo., and Billings, Mont., and has already notified John H. Burns, secretary-treasurer of the congress, that it will enter the state contest this year in an effort to win the third cup in succession.

Montana, however, has arisen to the occasion and is now gathering an exhibit that promises to be a worthy rival. Other competitors will probably be North Dakota, South Dakota, New Mexico, Texas, Oklahoma, Arizona, Nevada, Utah, Wyoming, western Kansas and Nebraska, Idaho and Oregon.

The following rule has been adopted by the board of governors of the congress regarding the territory from which exhibits of products can be accepted for exposition purposes:

"Exhibits will be accepted at the International Dry Farming exposition from that territory in the United States including the west of the 98th meridian and up to and including the 121st meridian, where the annual precipitation averages under 20 inches. It is understood, however, that such products will not be accepted when grown upon seepage, irrigated or sub-irrigated land."

Mr. Burns says that much interest has been aroused in the United States Canada and Mexico in the coming congress, and he looks for large delegations from various parts of the continent.

## STREETS OF SOUTHERN OREGON TOWN ARE PAVED WITH GOLD

### Tailings from Opp Mine Used in Pavement Will Run \$1.00 a Ton

 Portland, Aug. 13.—Oregon has two cities whose streets are paved with gold, and neither lays claim to being the New Jerusalem either. Medford and Jacksonville are the towns with the expensive pavements. Sand used in the cement sidewalks of Jacksonville is taken from the tailings of the Opp mine, an extensive gold producer. These tailings were piled up before the construction of the cyanide plant and not all the gold was extracted from it. The tailings will run \$1 to the ton in free gold.

The same material is used in paving the Medford streets. It is estimated that Medford pavements have more than \$30,000 contained in them, exclusive of the cost of these improvements to the municipality.

During July the Portland stock yards received 414 cars of stock, in which were 6850 cattle, 5958 horses, 15,143 sheep and 331 hogs and mules. Six dollars per hundred was the highest paid for cattle, \$10.30 for hogs, \$6 for lambs and \$4 for the best wethers.

## W. C. T. U. NOTES

Wanted—Help to enforce law down in west Lincoln county. In the open towns, among the licensed saloons, blind pigs, speakeasios and such like. Yes, the government is getting busy there now. Somebody has been selling bad firewater to Uncle Sam's wards and made noble red man "heap big drunk." And so the officers are trying to deprive the poor Indian of his personal liberty. And this, too, in the face of the fact that the Rev. Wasson has declared very plainly that "prohibition is an attempt to deprive men of what they believe to be an inherent right," and that "the underlying issue in this whole controversy. And that you can't make people moral by legislation." Yet a few men got together at Washington and decided that because a few poor Indians, after taking a glass of whiskey "persecute" and do a little indiscriminate killing the poor Indians must all be forever debarred from the saloon which fills a legitimate social need; and it is more than useless to attempt to keep the poor Siletts out of the saloon or away from bad whiskey until some "suitable substitute is provided." Especially is this true where the "public sentiment" is anti-prohibition. And you know Lincoln county is overwhelmingly for saloons.

Two years ago after a hard fight the wets wanted but one vote of rolling up a magnificent majority of four. And so, as the dealer wants to sell and the drinker wants to drink, what can a "mere law" be expected to do, even though backed by Uncle Sam? why, the law forbidding the sale of intoxicants to Indians has been on the statutes for approximately forty years, and still the sale goes on. And so long as the government is in partnership with the liquor dealer it will be likely to go on. And so long as men are sent to congress who do not realize that the most important question before the people today is the liquor traffic, and that it is their duty as the nation's guardians to protect the people's interest, just so long will the net which the liquor dealer and manufacturer have wound around the country be harder to break, and more deplorable the conditions in nation, state and home.

In the meantime Uncle Sam no doubt would like help in the prosecution of those illegal booze sellers down in Lincoln, and who under so much obligations as his partners? And who so well qualified, so up to all the ins and outs of the trade, or who would be so highly appreciated as the Greater Oregon Home Rule Reddy Amendment majority?

## GRAY WOLF TAKES SEA TRIP ON LOG RAFT

### Got On in Columbia River and Landed at San Diego, California

 Portland, Aug. 13.—Reaching San Diego after a stormy sea voyage of two weeks without food on board a big log raft a large gray timber wolf was shot while roaming the yards of the Russ Lumber company at that place searching for food.

The raft and wolf came to San Diego from the Columbia river logging camps near Portland. The logs are bound together with great chains into a cigar-shaped raft, containing millions of feet of lumber. Powerful tugs take them in tow for the ocean voyage south.

The rafts are moored near the shore while waiting dispatch, and it was there, it is supposed, that the wolf took passage. These log rafts are the biggest floated anywhere in the world, and a wolf could easily hide himself on board before being pulled to sea.

## TOO 42 YEARS TO COLLECT \$12

### J. W. Range, Alaska Miner, Has Hard Time Getting Money From Uncle Sam

 Portland, Aug. 13.—It took the United States government 42 years to pay a debt of \$12 in the case of J. W. Range, an Alaska miner now in Portland. He has just received a check for the amount from Uncle Sam. Moreover, he had to give up one-third of the \$12 to a collector in Washington, D. C.

Range served three years in the Civil war and when he returned to his home at Mill Village, Pa., his friends wanted to do something for him and made him postmaster. He resigned in less than a year and came west.

Five years ago he received a letter from a Washington attorney advising him that he had a just claim against the government for \$12 and that he would collect it for one-third of the amount. Range told the attorney to go ahead and collect anything he had coming.

Although a tardy paymaster, Uncle Sam proved good for the claim and the check came for \$12, signed by Secretary MacVeigh. He then sent the attorney \$4 of the long-delayed settlement. The sum was for the overpayment of postage stamps.

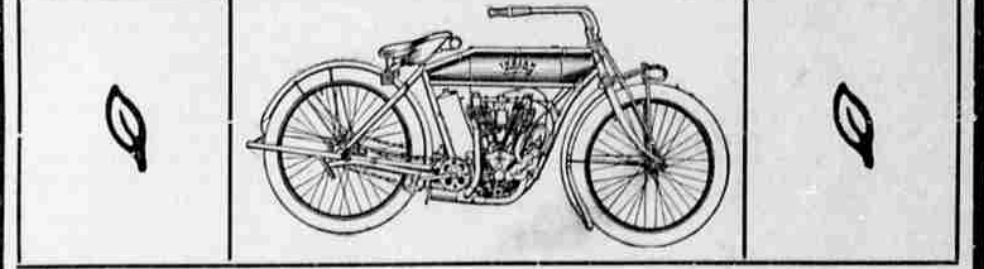
