BALLINGER WILL BE FORCED TO QUIT

President Taft Convinced That
 Party Must Be Re-
 organized

Washington, Aug. 16.—Everything
 that has happened this week around
 the Summer haunts of the Republican
 National leaders conspires to the be-
 lief that the Administration is pre-
 paring to clean house before the vot-
 ers of the country take the job upon
 their own shoulders.

Every succeeding bit of news out
 of Beverly makes clearer the why
 and wherefore of mysterious trips to
 the West by silent-footed commis-
 sioners throws a brighter light upon the
 meaning of the conferences to which
 President Taft has summoned Sena-
 tors, state leaders and managers of
 the highest in party authority as to
 what they must do to be saved.

Country is "Reassured."
 It is generally believed here that
 the Beverly dispatches speak by the
 card with reference to the retirement
 of Secretary Ballinger from the Cab-
 inet. There was no news necessary
 for chronicling the fact at the time
 that Speaker Cannon is not to be re-
 elected Speaker. In the event that the
 next House of Representatives is Re-
 publican, his prospective retirement
 to the ranks has been discounted be-
 fore a single primary was held this
 year. Neither is it fresh information
 that Senator Aldrich intends to retire
 at the end of his present term.

The significance in the linking of
 three prominent figures lies in the
 fact that the Administration wants
 as it were—that there is to be no ho-
 cuspus the conviction that the Ad-
 ministration is giving moral support
 to the promised transformation.

REAL ESTATE MEN REPORT MORE ACTIVITY

 men report that beginning with last
 week they can see the end of the dull
 period in land sales that has been
 noticed this summer. Although there
 have been no heavy sales to report,
 there have been considerable small
 city transfers and many inquiries
 for all sorts of property coming from
 all quarters. Investors are "looking
 up," as the dealers say. Inquiries
 from rich buyers for big pieces of
 property are coming every day and
 there is a general nosing around that
 is encouraging to the commission
 men. After the period of dullness
 and a steady growth this summer it
 is thought that the business will be
 heavy this fall.

ARMY GIRLS MUST PASS BY SALOONS.

Mayor Gill, of Seattle, Will Is-
 sue Orders to Arrest
 All Who Enter

Seattle, Wash., Aug. 16.—Mayor
 H. C. Gill has issued orders
 to Chief of Police C. W. Wapensteen
 to arrest every Salvation Army lass
 and newsboys found in the saloons.

"Public saloons are no place for
 women," said the mayor today. "The
 Salvation Army does a great deal of
 good, but if they want to get money
 from barroom loungers, then let their
 uniform men go in after it. The
 sight of women in saloons is disgust-
 ing to me, and I believe it is to 99
 out of every 100 men."

"So long as I am mayor, women
 must keep out of the saloons, and
 this means women in every walk of
 life. And so long as I have made up
 my mind about the women, I thought
 I might as well go one step farther
 and bar the newsboys. I've many
 good friends among the newsies, and
 will do anything I can for them, but
 the saloon is no place for small boys.
 The little fellows who are compelled
 to knock about the streets selling pa-
 pers for a living have enough tempta-
 tion, and as long as I am mayor
 they also must keep out of the bar-
 rooms."

A LOGGERS' APPEAL.

The story of hard luck among the
 fir and pine, which occurred in the
 month of April, 1906, when I sud-
 denly lost the sight of both eyes and
 the use of my arms and legs, caused
 by an injury to the spine.
 My name is James J. Dormody,
 My age is forty-nine.
 A logger's life for years I've led
 Among the fir and pine.
 I have logged in Minnesota,
 At Swan River and Deadham,
 In North Wisconsin's white pine
 woods,
 And through Northern Michigan.

On the Blackfoot in Montana
 And at St. Mary's, Idaho,
 In Washington and Oregon,
 Where the tall evergreens do grow.
 For the Eastern and Western at Eu-
 phalia
 And D. L. Kelley at Blind Slough.
 Both sides of the Columbia
 There was work for all to do.

For Bill Reed I logged at Gobie
 And Sam Weis back of Oak Point.
 With Jake Reor, Benson's foreman,
 I commenced work on May the
 ninth.

For Hank Armstrong on Deadham
 creek
 In his camps Three and Two;
 With Weyerhaeuser in Clark county
 I was one of Fowler's crew.

But now my logging days are o'er,
 No more tall fir nor pine I'll see.
 I have lost my sight, the use of hands
 and limbs,
 And 'tis always night with me.
 For Booth and Kelley of Eugene,
 Where I logged last of all,
 At Wendling with Foreman Fowler,
 Employed on their log haul.

While thus employed my sight grew
 dim,
 Dark specks before it ran,
 'Till I could not see the gauge nor
 glass,
 Then my limbs refused to stand.
 My hands fell limp and powerless
 My heart nigh broke in two
 As I looked my last on daylight
 scenes,
 On Wallace Fowler and his crew.

To my fellow loggers throughout the
 land
 I bid you all a last farewell,
 Hoping that none of you will ever
 have
 Like me so sad a story to tell.
 And when you read of my hard luck
 I hope you will agree
 To help an old-time logger from want
 Who can neither feel, walk nor see.
