IN THE World of Sport

FAIR OUTLOOK FOR 'VARSITY FOOT BALL TEAM

Manager Watson and "Bill" Hayward Have Line on Some Good Material

With the opening of the university only a little over four weeks away and vacation nearly over, although it is still pretty early to size up the football situation, already the buzz of speculation among the enthusiasts of the game that will next take its place in the sport limelight has begun. The prospects for a winning team from Oregon this year are said to be good, still there is plenty room for a slip in the figures.

Of last year's team, five of whom could be considered regulars will return, or at least are expected back. They are "Captain" "Chuck" Taylor, right halfback; "Bill" Main, right tackle; Dan Mitchell, center; Edward Bailey, left guard; Earle Latourette, quarterback.

Besides these, eight of the subs, who were practically the same as regulars under Coach Forbes' dual team system, will be found on hand. They are Dean Walker, the first fullback; Graham Michael, end; Llewellyn McKinlay, halfback; Jack Hickson, end; Vernon Gilles, guard; Ben Chandler, quarterback; Robert Kellogg, guard; Ben Grout, guard.

Several Stars Lost.
The team will be much weakened by the loss of Dudley Clarke, Pinkham, Dodson, Kiltz and Sullivan, all

of whom have graduated. Elmer Storie and Glen Scott, the two freshmen giants, have both been lost to the line. They left before school was over last year to become ranchers in eastern Oregon. Clarke's place, however, will be the hardest to fill, for it will be necessary to develop a new punter and to find his equal will be well nigh an impossibility.

Manager Watson and Trainer "Bill" Hayward have been carefully scanning the list of applicants in next year's freshman class for the names of prep school stars, and they have been well rewarded in their search, for the outlook from this source is excellent. Among the new men will be Rupert Edmonds, a husky lad from La Connor, Wash.; McCormick, a back fielder from Roswell, Idaho; and Fenton, a 200-pounder from Dallas college. Then, in addition, are Noland and Norris, two Portland boys, who starred last year on the Portland academy team and who have expressed their intention of entering the Oregon ranks this fall. They play back field and end, respectively, and they have won for themselves a "rep" among the bigger football critics.

Oregon's schedule this coming year will not be as difficult as was last year's, but there is a great probability that the northwest championship will remain undecided. For the first time in many years Oregon and Washington will not meet. It was found impossible to arrange a satisfactory date and the northern state had to be left out. However, to those who watch the game carefully and feel that they can pick the best team on comparative merits there will be some consolation in the fact that Washington and Pullman meet again this year.

Aside from this the state schedule is ideal. The hard games are late in the season and are well separated. This was the chief difficulty with last season's arrangement of games. The hard games came all in a bunch and Oregon was crippled for the final contest with the University of Washington on Thanksgiving day. The O. A. C. games just a few days before is considered by many as what gave Washington the championship.

There will be two local games next year, one with Willamette university on Oct. 22, and one with Whitworth college on Nov. 19. The game with the University of Idaho will be played at Moscow on Oct. 29. The two big games are in Portland. The O. A. C. game will be played there, for this is Corvallis' turn to choose the grounds, and Multnomah once again gets the Thanksgiving date.

BOB ARMSTRONG LAID JEFF OUT

Chicago, Aug. 16.—Marty Cutler, sparring partner of Jack Johnson, is back in Chicago with stories supporting the charges that efforts were made to get Johnson to "lay down" to Jeffries.

MILLIONS PAID TO BALL PLAYERS

New York, Aug. 16.—More than \$5,000,000 will be paid out this year in salaries to baseball players. This does not include the enormous expense of keeping parks in order, buying supplies and paying traveling expenses. The total expenditure for the baseball of the two big leagues during the season this year will run close to \$10,000,000. Baseball is a paying institution, August Herrman, chairman of the National Baseball Commission, predicts that this season will pay 8 per cent on the money invested in baseball. "Baseball is the greatest business in the land," says he. "It is a progressive business and is continually growing."

PAPER MILL AT LEBANON STOPS WORK

The Lebanon Paper Mill Co. today closed its plant down and will remain closed until the trouble with the people of Lebanon and vicinity is settled. As the company pays out \$5000 a month for labor it will mean a severe blow to the city.

The mill company offers to pay half the expense of a sewer from the mill to the river in order to adjust the water dispute.

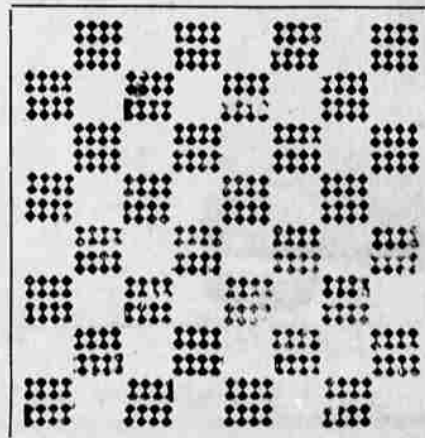
