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AUTO MAKES BETTER TIME THAN TRAIN TO NEWPORT RESORT

John Kelly's White Steamer Makes the Trip in Eight Hours

What is thought by many to be the best trip in an automobile out of Eugene, considering the condition of the roads and the strain on the car, is the 97-mile trip from here to Newport, according to the opinion of Ivart Clem, chauffeur for John Kelly, who returned from there Wednesday in eight hours with Mr. Kelly in his White steamer. The roads, going the route they did, are even better than the McKenzie trip, and there are no rocks to cut the tires and necessitate slow traveling and few ruts and mud holes. The route taken is by way of Monroe and Philomath, not passing through Corvallis at all. After leaving Monroe, heading for Corvallis, they turned west about ten miles beyond Monroe, and soon entered the mountains. This mountain road, it seems, is different from the usual road that winds about edges of precipices with sharp rocks to cut the tires or endanger the bottom of the machine, but smoothly winds in and about the hills with little dust and nothing worse than a stiff grade occasionally. There are several long hills, but nothing that proved at all too much for the car. The worst grades are coming this way.

The time taken on the trip, just eight hours, is less than the time taken by the train. They left Newport at 8:20 a. m. and were home at 5:25 p. m., stopping an hour for lunch. The trip to the coast was made in equally as good time. They left Mrs. Kelly, Miss Gretta Bristow and Miss Flora Patterson for a two weeks' outing on the beach and brought back Mr. and Mrs. F. M. Wilkins, who have been spending an outing at the seaside resort.

New York, Aug. 20.—All preparations have been completed to make the theatrical field day in aid of the actors' fund of America at the Polo Grounds tomorrow a success. The various theatrical clubs, the Lambs, the Players, The Friars, the White Rats, the Green Room, the Comedy club and the Professional Woman's League, have arranged special features of their own. The girls from the summer musical shows will be out on the fields in their costumes, and a feature will be a big ballet on the grass under the direction of James Gorman. There will be baseball games between actors and managers, soubrettes and leading ladies, and races for everybody. Bert Williams and Jack Johnson will give a three-round boxing bout and Annie Oakley has challenged Buffalo Bill to a rifle shooting contest.

The Republic theater, formerly known as the Balascon, will reopen its doors for the season of 1910-11 next Monday night with a new comedy by Winchell Smith. Jane Maybury has been engaged for the part of Agnes Elliston, the leading female role. The name of the play is "Bobby Burnitt."

Having made a success of her venture into vaudeville, Laura Jean Libbey, who has been reciting original poems and a love monologue on the American Roof Garden stage, announces that she will go into the legitimate. She intends to assume the leading role in a dramatic playlet she has written. If this second step is a success, Miss Libbey will go into deeper water and star in a four-act play, which is also ready. However, her vaudeville contract has seven more weeks to run with William Morris Inc.

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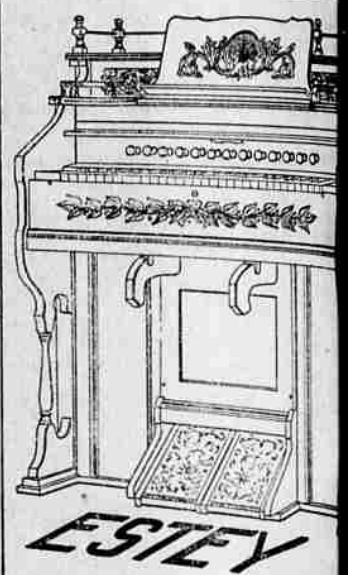
