MARION COUNTY CLERK IS AGAINST ASSEMBLY

Salem, Or., Aug. 20.—R. D. Allen, the present county clerk of Marion county, today filed his declaration of intention to be a candidate to succeed himself in the primaries to be held Sept. 24. Mr. Allen refused to go into the county convention and is strongly in favor of direct primary methods. His home is at Silverton and he is very popular with his country constituents, despite the fact that he is asking a third term at their hands.

On his ballot Mr. Allen asks to have printed these words: "Against bossism; let the rank and file of political parties make their own nominations."

Mr. Allen's candidacy will precipitate a hot fight between the assembly forces on one hand and direct primary supporters on the other for the county clerk's office in this county, with odds in favor of Allen.

RAILROAD SITUATION IS AT STANDSTILL

Klamath Falls, Or., Aug. 20.—Oregon Trunk surveys have been working in the north end of the county for some time. The one survey made by the company passes through the Harriman estate, Pelican bay, and runs as far south as Lake o' the Woods. The surveys have not worked further south than this point, but have put in most of their time on the line across the mountains to Medford.

It cannot be learned if the road is coming south along the east side or the west side of the upper Klamath lake. Work has not been resumed in the northern portion of the county by the construction crews. The situation seems to be at a standstill except that the surveyors are in the field, and that a number of prominent officials of the Hill lines are going over the ground to make reconnoissances.

CHINESE MUST CUT OFF QUEUES

Royal Edict to That Effect Will Soon Be Promulgated

Peking, Aug. 20.—A royal edict promulgated by Prince Chun, the regent, instituting the most modern reform in Chinese life, being prepared today, directs 400,000,000 Chinese to cut off their queues. The order will be issued as soon as the grand council deems public sentiment ripe for the radical change from an immemorial custom of the Mongols.

Behind the order lies one of the greatest fights in recent years between reform Chinese and the other officials of the grand council. Prince Tsai Tao, who with Tong Shi Yi bore the imperial thanks to Washington for the remission of the Boxer indemnity, is sponsor for the reform.

After a tour of the world Prince Tsai informed the grand council that Chinese generally were ridiculed because of the queue. He called upon Prince Chun to authorize an edict. Wu Yuk Sang, a member of the council, supported by many other members, objected and incurred the wrath of the regent, who ordered the severance of Wu Yuk Sang's political queue.

Prince Chun will first order the soldiers of the Chinese army to cut their queues then will come the navy and lastly the people.

The queue has been worn by the mongols as a badge of obedience to the Tartar or Manchu sovereignty, and although the Manchu dynasty still is in the throne and hated by the Mongols, it is feared that a sudden order to abandon the queue will result in rioting.

Threshing of early grain is getting well under way in the vicinity of Hillsboro, and some fine yields are reported. One 10-acre field of oats near that town threshed 29 bushels to the acre, while 70 and 75 bushels to the acre have been reported from several fields. The early sowing is showing the best yield. Some fields of winter wheat run 30 and 32 bushels.

PATTEN ASSERTS THE WHEAT CROP IS SHORT

Chicago, Aug. 20.—James A. Patten, one time wheat and cotton king, declared today that a substitute for wheat is the greatest of the world's needs, but could name none.

Patten returned to Chicago today from a tour through Europe, where he investigated crop conditions. He declared that the world's supply of wheat for 1910 is apparently the minimum of the decade and that the shortage is so great that it is high time to consider a substitute.

"How about corn as a substitute?" he was asked. "People cannot live on corn bread," he declared, "nor on breakfast foods, many of the best ones being made of wheat."

"A real substitute is absolutely necessary," he continued. "Conditions in France are very bad. It is a non-importing country and the shortage within its boundaries reaches anywhere from sixty millions to one hundred billion bushels. The Argentine Republic is a possible solution, but it will be December before we know anything much about its yield."

Patten has "retired" but he could not get past the wheat pit on his way from the depot. He "looked in" and then went to his old offices in the Board of Trade building and placed an order.

ST. LOUIS, MO., 687,029 POPULATION

Washington, Aug. 20.—The census bureau tonight announced that the 1910 enumeration showed a population of 687,029 for St. Louis, Mo., which is an increase of 111,781, or 19.4 per cent, since 1900, when St. Louis had 575,238 inhabitants. In 1900 Boston had 569,892 people and not until the new census for Boston is announced will it be known positively whether St. Louis holds her place as the fourth American city.

Washington, Aug. 20.—The population of Atlanta, Ga., is 154,839, according to the census bureau. The population in 1900 was 89,872. The increase is 64,967, or 72 per cent. The population of Detroit, Mich., is 465,766, an increase of 180,662, or 63 per cent, as compared with 285,104 in 1900.

POSTOFFICE ADVANCED TO NEXT HIGHER CLASS

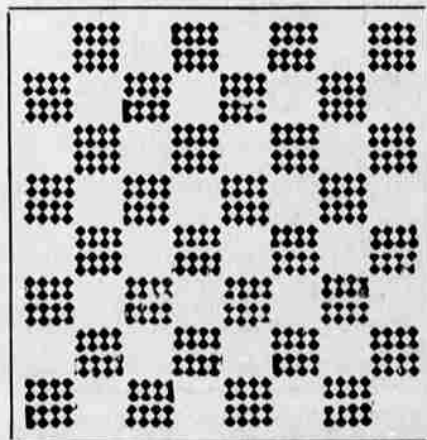
Cottage Grove, Aug. 22.—The increase in the postoffice receipts for the past twelve months ending June 30, 1910, over the preceding year is \$1266.15, or an increase sufficient to the third class. The business for the year amounted to \$7267.87, while for the previous twelve months it was \$5491.72. The best month of the present year was April, when the receipts amounted to \$982.89.
