Bohrstedt Company Lets Contract—Other Creswell News

One of the most important deals ever made in Creswell was made today when the A. C. Bohrstedt Orchard Company let a contract to the Schmitt Brothers to do the orchard work for five years on and around the company's holdings.

This does not mean that the A. C. Bohrstedt company releases its supervision of the work, but that Schmitt Brothers will do all the work under the supervision of Hon. W. K. Newell, president of the state board of horticulture, and his assistant superintendent of orchard work, S. Shotwell. The contract covers all the orchard work and Schmitt Brothers will simply step in and hire the men, furnish all the equipment and do all the work necessary for the cultivation and care of the orchards, so that the company deals with one firm instead of a large number of people.

A contract was let for a temporary bank building and it is expected that the bank, which will have a capital of \$10,000, will be ready for business by October 1. The officers of the new institution have not been selected.—Creswell Chronicle.

CAMPS ALONG

CALAPOOIA RIVER

HAVE BURNED

Brownsville, Or., Aug. 26.—The fire along the Calapoopia river, having been fanned by a strong east wind for the past 24 hours, is now beyond control that nothing but rain will check. F. M. Brown, O. S. Boyles and William Robe returned this morning. They were surrounded by the fire yesterday morning, their provisions and bedding were burned, and their hair and eyebrows singed.

The camp of the Calapoopia Lumber Company burned late yesterday, also the Moyers camp, now owned by the Drew Lumber Co., of Portland. Sawyer Bros. are backfiring to save their big mill. A telephone message this morning says the fire is within one mile of the mill, and a strong wind carries burning limbs half a mile ahead of the fire.

Carson Kindig, a cook for the Calapoopia Lumber Company, came near losing his life yesterday. While cooking supper burning brands caught him and set the bunkhouse afire. He ran for half a mile to the river.

The town of Holly faces destruction unless the wind changes. It is believed the fire has gone eastward to the government reserve. If conditions continue worse the town will call troops to fight the fire.

Campers from Cascadia summer resort, 32 miles east, are telephoning for conveyances. No danger is felt for them, as the fire is working in the opposite direction. The fire from the Wendling section is coming over the ridge south of Crawfordville, and should the wind continue the whole Calapoopia valley and mountains will be on fire. Cinders and ashes have fallen here since 3 p. m. yesterday. The east wind carried them 15 miles. Farmers near Holly are moving out. They worked all night, and none of their houses have been burned yet.

FIRES ON ROW RIVER

ABOVE COTTAGE GROVE

Cottage Grove, Or., Aug. 25.—Forest fires have been raging at four different points on the Row river, east of here, along the Oregon & South-eastern railroad, for several days. They are at Dorena, which is located nine miles out; at Star, 12 miles; at Wildwood, 18, and Diston, about 21 miles, but were kept under control until last evening, when a strong wind carried the flames at Wildwood to the homes of J. T. Hunt and Geo. Kerr, driving out the occupants. There is very little hope of saving the dwellings. At the Diston lumber camp the men fought fire all of yesterday, some help going from here. Assistant Superintendent Protzman, of the Oregon & South-eastern railroad, who is in the Wildwood district looking after the company's interests, telephoned for help late last evening, and Superintendent Wood dispatched three carloads of apparatus for fighting the fires. There are about 150 available men in the fire zone, with Forest Ranger Holderman and assistants to superintend the work. It is impossible to get an accurate report of the damage done over the burned area today.

SALEM MAYOR IS

STILL IN PARIS

Salem, Or., Aug. 26.—The executive offices have received a card from Mayor George F. Rodgers, of Salem, saying he was still in Paris, after having attended the meeting of the International Good Road Builders there. He writes that the mission of the Oregon delegates has been fulfilled.

He says that H. L. Pittcock, of Portland was also in attendance as a delegate, and that Oregon was the only state in the Union represented by a full delegation.
