NO PENSIONS FOR FOREST RANGERS

Only Regular Troops Injured in Fires Can Expect Pay for Disability

Washington, Aug. 29.—Under the general pension laws of the United States all Federal troops injured in fighting forest fires in the Northwest will receive pensions in accordance with the degree of their injury, for the soldiers now engaged in this work are operating under orders of the war department, and any injury received will be in the line of duty.

State troops who may be injured will not be pensionable, as they have been ordered out by the respective governors and not by the president of the United States. There is no law under which forest rangers and guards injured while fighting fires may be pensioned by the Federal government. It will be necessary for congress to pass a special act for their relief if they are to be compensated for injuries sustained in the field.

SUDDEN DEATH

OF MRS. WILL SEE

Wednesday afternoon word was received at Coburg by Mrs. Chapoulka and Lucian Ward that Mrs. Will See had died suddenly that morning in Portland.

Mrs. See was well acquainted in and around Coburg by the old settlers as she lived here until about 14 years ago, when with her husband she went to Portland, which has since been their home.

This sad news was quite a shock to Mr. Ward, her brother, and Mrs. Chapoulka, Mr. See's sister. Mr. Ward left this morning to attend the funeral. He said Mrs. See had been troubled with her heart for several years, and this doubtless was the cause of her sudden death. She was about 51 years of age.—Journal.
