LIGHTNING KILLS OSWEGO, OR., MAN

Oswego, Or., Aug. 29.—Ray Thom-
 as was struck by lightning and in-
 stantly killed here Sunday. He was
 the 23-year-old son of J. W. Thomas,
 Mayor of Oswego. The young man
 was killed at 1 o'clock, during a
 storm which lasted about three-
 quarters of an hour. His body was
 found by Mr. Jenne of Jenne & Erier,
 about 20 minutes later.

The young man was boarding with
 Mr. Jenne, who conducts a butcher
 shop at Oswego. He had been
 driving the wagon. Just before the
 lightning killed him he had gone to
 the barn to feed the horses. Sudden-
 ly there was a loud report and
 the vivid flash struck the cupola,
 and had run down a rafter and into
 a post beside Thomas' body. From
 the appearance of the body, the el-
 ectricity seemed to have struck him
 in the back.

THINKS STEVE CARVER IS WORKING FOR S. P.

 At different times in the past two
 or three years we have stated that
 it is our opinion that the Carver
 railroad will be extended to Flor-
 ence, basing our opinion on the cer-
 tainty that this will be made a good
 harbor, the natural resources of the
 country along the line, and the ease
 with which the road can be built.
 It has been generally thought that
 the Southern Pacific is back of Car-
 ver. Last week a party of surveyors
 supposed to be sent out by the
 Southern Pacific have started from
 Junction and from a word or two
 dropped occasionally it is thought
 they are surveying a line by way of
 Blachley and Lake Creek to Flor-
 ence. Carver is improving his road,
 and putting it in condition for busi-
 ness. Now what is more probable
 than that the Southern Pacific in-
 tends to build from Junction to
 Florence, connecting with the Car-
 ver road, and possibly extending the
 line from there on down the coast?

R. G. SMITH WILL ENTER CONGRESSIONAL RACE

Salem, Or., Aug. 30.—In a letter
 to a friend in this city Robert G.
 Smith, of Grants Pass, Josephine
 County, has informally announced
 his intention of making the race for
 Congress in the First Congressional
 District, upon the Democratic tick-
 et, against Congressman Hawley, of
 this city, and B. F. Mulkey, of Ash-
 land. Mr. Smith is the first Demo-
 crat to come out as a candidate for
 Congress in this district. He states
 in his letter that he expects to make
 formal announcement of his candi-
 date within a few days, and that he
 will make a strenuous campaign for
 the office after the primaries. Mr.
 Smith has served as a member of
 the lower branch of the Oregon Leg-
 islature for two terms.

ORDER AFFECTING SPRINGFIELD BANK

WASHINGTON, Aug. 30.—The
 treasury department has extended
 the corporate existence of the As-
 toria National bank of Astoria, Ore-
 gon, to August 9, 1930.

 designated by the treasury depart-
 ment as reserve agent for the fol-
 lowing national banks in Oregon:

 of Condon and Corvallis; First Na-
 tional of Grants Pass, Harrisburg

 La Grande; McMinville National;
 First National and Medford Nation-
 al banks; First National of North
 Bend; Ontario National; Douglas
 National of Roseburg; Capital Na-
 tional of Salem; First National of
 Springfield and The Dalles; the Na-
 tional bank of Union.

The United States National bank

 Commerce of New York and the
 Crocker National bank of San Fran-
 cisco have been designated as re-
 serve agents for the United States
 National bank of McMinville.
 During the last fiscal year \$743,-
 981 in internal revenue taxes were

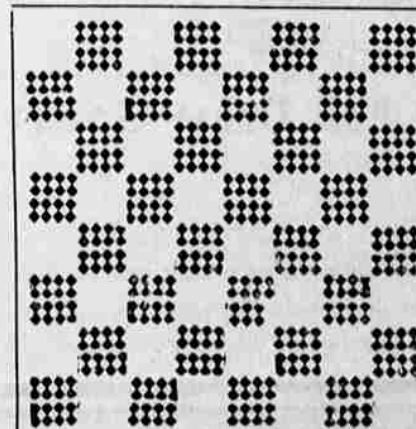
