Major Bailey K. Ashford, the discoverer of the hookworm, is now in Europe to take part in the congresses of hygiene and health, according to the news dispatches. Major Ashford has been stationed as United States army surgeon in Porto Rico for the last ten years, and has had exceptional opportunities for the study of the dread disease which he was the first to trace to its origin. He declares that 300,000 cases of hookworm have been reported in Porto Rico, equal to one-third of the population of the island. The death rate from the disease, which at first averaged 40 in each 1,000 cases, has been reduced to half that number.

Chas. N. Griswold has retired from the contest for county clerk in the republican primaries, in order to make the issue between the assembly and anti-assembly candidates clean-cut. Mr. Griswold states his position very clearly in his letter of withdrawal, and is to be commended for taking the position that the success of a principle is more to be desired than personal advancement.

If two out of the three anti-assembly candidates for Governor would withdraw and unite their vote on one man, Jay Bowerman, the assembly nominee, would be sent back to his corporation law practice, and a man representing the people would be chosen governor of Oregon.
