The track was bad, but according to most people in attendance, the races were worse. Five cars were entered in the 50-mile race, billed as the feature of the day. A Coxton-Keston car with Paul Sprague of Astoria, driving, finished 10 miles to the good. His time was 1 hr 4 minutes and 33 seconds. A mannan car, driven by Martin, of Portland, was second, finishing the course and averaging 1:15 to the mile. The other three cars failed to finish.
