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SPRINGFIELD

SEVEN BRICK OR CONCRETE BLOCKS ARE CONTEMPLATED

Springfield, Oct. 5.—Seven brick or concrete blocks are in sight for Springfield next spring, and at least five of these are a practical certainty. C. H. Rivett, who is a building contractor, made the statement yesterday that he had five buildings in sight for construction next spring as a certainty. He declined, though, to specify any of them. However, those that are known to be under consideration by the property owners are the following: Peery & Winzenried announce positively that they will erect a two-story brick at the southeast corner of Fourth and Main streets. This was planned for this summer, but the plans were delayed. Both gentlemen positively declare that the building will go up next spring. Paul Bettelheim has expressed his intentions of erecting a business block on the northwest corner of Second and Main, and the lot is now vacant. The probabilities for this are also very good. F. A. Rankin, of Eugene, who owns the property on the corner of Third and Main, expects to construct a brick block there. Robert Vitus, who has the southwest corner of Fifth and Main, has also expressed his intention of building next summer. It is also known that the owners of the corner on which the post office is located will build in the spring. Yesterday M. M. Peery made arrangements with a Eugene party whose name is not announced to pay part for a joint wall between his property in which the drug store is located and the lot directly east, which may be purchased within the next few days by the Eugene party. In case the sale is made, the building is a certainty. It was announced in The Guard a few days ago that Mrs. Nurte, of Eugene, who is to purchase the lot directly across the street from this location, would probably build and today the papers were signed up with the adjoining property owners to build a joint wall. This is the seventh prospective building summing up the locations. It can be seen that the west end of Main street is to be well built up with brick and the whole street will be evenly balanced.

GREAT ACTIVITY ON SPRINGFIELD'S STREETS

Springfield, Oct. 5.—Between the building of the P. E. & E. to the P. coast and the re-building of some seventeen blocks of streets, the

city of Springfield shows unusual activity. Both jobs are under the supervision of Superintendent Baker of the streetcar company and the work is being rushed with his characteristic speed. Yesterday a whole block was graded, this being from Fourth to Fifth on F, and at this rate it will be possible to accomplish the whole work before winter sets in, which is more than was hoped could be accomplished.

Blasting was commenced at the rock quarry today and Thursday the new crusher will be started with a good force of men. Main street, since the streetcar line is being constructed, is in a torn up condition, and the three blocks of steel will be completed within a few days with the several teams and the grangers at work. The track will only be laid as far as the railroad track until the frog for a crossing can be received.

BIG BRIDGE NOW ALL BUT FINISHED

Springfield, Oct. 5.—The bolts on the last span of the big 600-foot bridge were tightened up yesterday and this morning and it was with pride that Mr. Roney's bridge-builders realized that the whole bridge was in the air. The false work was taken down this afternoon and the bridge from its outward appearance stood complete. Mr. Roney says it will take seven or eight days to finish it up ready for the rails, then the cars can be running down to Main street in Springfield.

The big structure has been built in remarkable time. It has been completed over two months ahead of the time allowed the builder. It was started about the last of May, when the timbers were first hauled on the ground for the foot bridge, and has been built in virtually four months. It is a triumph in Mr. Roney's record in bridge building. The work has been done without a hitch. Every condition has been favorable from the location, where bed rock was almost on the surface, to the advantageous and unusually low water all through its construction. Springfield and Eugene are now ready to shake hands.

19 PER CENT. INCREASE IN POSTAL RECEIPTS

Springfield, Oct. 5.—Nineteen per cent gain is the record in the postal receipts at Springfield for the quarter ending September 30 over the same period last year. The total sales for the third quarter in 1910 are \$18,011 and for the same period in 1909, \$15,145, showing an increase of \$2,866. The receipts for September this year were quite low, being even smaller than in the previous year, but this is accounted for by the fact that in August many of the merchants secured a stock of

stamped envelopes which were specially printed by the government. This has since cut down the stamp sales. The sales for September this year were \$265.06. It was noticed in the sales for August especially that the election increased the sales considerably from the number of stamps bought by the various candidates for advertising purposes.

Springfield Brevities

Springfield, Oct. 5.—The rains of this week raised the river some two feet yesterday and by many it was feared that the small foot bridge would be taken out. At noon the crest of the rise was reached and the water slowly receded, dropping about three inches in the afternoon. The fact that the water did not rise enough to start the drift wood saved the temporary bridge. There is no danger to be feared by pedestrians, however, for it would stand much higher water if there was no drift. Constructed as it is, the greater force of the water against it the deeper the piling is forced into the gravel bed. Mr. Roney expressed himself that it would hold with the water within a foot of the planks if there was no drift.

In the October number of the Electrical Journal, a technical magazine published in San Francisco, there is a news item that the Northwestern Corporation, of Eugene, has purchased a 2,000-kilowatt turbine generator, to be installed at the Springfield plant. It is a Curtis machine and is four times larger than either of the present Allen-Chalmers turbines that are now in the plant, and twice their combined capacity.

A. Middleton, who has had charge of Al Kuykendall's Springfield drug store, is taking his vacation looking over the Coos Bay region. He is accompanied by his brother, E. Middleton, who lives in Ohio but is touring in charge of Mike Berry who seems the West. In his absence, the store perfectly natural in his old stand.

All real estate has been moving very rapidly during the past week, especially the city lots. On Williams Heights during the week the Realty company declare that they have done over \$4,000 business. Among the purchasers who intend to make Springfield their homes are two Michigan men, one from Eugene and one from Eastern Oregon.
