THRILLING ACCOUNT OF EXPLOSION OF RAILROAD ENGINE

E. K. Darrin, formerly of Eu-
gene, Writes of Terri-
ble Disaster

The following is an extract from a
letter written by E. K. Darrin, of
Denver, who visited his father-in-
law, G. K. Munroe, of this city, two
weeks ago, and describes a thrilling
railroad accident that happened on
the Denver & Rio Grande road on
his return trip:
"At last one of the most eventful
railroad trips of my life is over. I
arrived here this morning, although
I was due here at 7:45 last night.
Left Ogden on time, but from Salt
Lake we lost time steadily. Going
over Tennessee Pass, near Leadville,
we had three engines on, two in
front and one behind. We had
reached an elevation of about 10,000
feet, and almost up to the tunnel on
top of Continental Divide, when just
as I was looking out of the window
of the first Pullman, I saw the first
engine—an immense one—suddenly
disintegrate. I distinctly saw the
form of a man probably two hun-
dred feet in the air, flying through
space, while portions of the engine
were flying in every direction. All
of this I saw before the noise of the
explosion reached us. Of course the
train stopped very suddenly, and the
passengers were much shaken up—
more scared than hurt, though. I
was the only one who knew what had
happened (this without boasting),
and told the passengers that there
was no further danger for them, but
that help was needed ahead. They
piled out and it was a sorry sight
for them. The first engine was en-
tirely destroyed, but the second, while
sadly dilapidated, was still in a con-
dition to help hold the train.
"The engineer and fireman of the
first engine were both killed, while
the engineer and fireman of the sec-
ond engine were badly cut around
the head, the fireman having one ear
nearly cut from his head. Again I
was in evidence, for I was the only
one on the train that knew how to
render first aid to the injured. For
an hour I was busy dressing cuts
and bruises. That bottle of peroxide
came in mighty good. While I was
doing this the passengers were look-
ing for the bodies. I was able to tell
about where to look for the one I
saw flying through the air, which
they found nearly two hundred yards
—600 feet—from the point of explo-

sion. The trunk of the engineer was
found at right angles to the fire-
man over three hundred yards—900
feet from the explosion, and about a
quarter of a mile apart. I found one
of his legs and his vest and the up-
per part of his trousers an hour and
a half afterward nearly three hun-
dred yards (his leg) directly back
of the train. Both of his legs had
been torn from the body. The body
of the engineer went ahead nearly
three hundred feet, and landed
against a bank. Some of the pieces
of the engine were thrown nearly a
half mile. It was the worst wreck I
have seen, and the old conductor—
47 years at it—said the same. The
only good thing about it was the
men never knew what hit them."

vorce would procure."

kane in November, 1904, and have
a four-year old child.
