SMALL PIECE OF ROAD WHICH SHOULD BE IMPROVED

To the Editor:—The worst road in Lane county is the continuation of Helen street on the county road that is now six years old and is within two blocks of the city limits.

The street railway has made a fine road on both sides of the track west where the car line turns north, but all their good work is absolutely useless with the 1200 or 1500 feet of impassable road, for it is barely passable now, and when the rains set in, it will be impossible to get through either foot or with any vehicles.

The road has been in this condition all summer. Autos could not pass, many buggies and like vehicles turn back or go through the field. One lady drove to the ditch, unhitched her horse, and pulled the buggy over the worst, then hitched on. Another neighbor broke his buggy at the same time, was thrown out, and the writer fell in the ditch and was badly shaken up.

Wood haulers refused to haul wood to one of the neighbors over this road. Neighboring farmers drive to and from the car at this point, which will be impossible when the rains begin.

All the immediate families are here and were attracted to Eugene by the advertising of the splendid advantages of Eugene and Lane county. All have invested in real estate, and feel that they are entitled to some consideration.

We have exhausted every known means to get the county judge and commissioners to fix the road. Several petitions have been gotten up and different individuals have gone to them personally, and pleaded their cause, to be told that the people that own the land are speculators and that the county cannot build roads for speculators, yet this is a county road.

The people that are directly affected by this road are not speculators, but home-builders that have come to build homes, but in case they were speculators, would they not have to pay taxes on the land?

Have the county officials the right to discriminate against individuals or carry their petty grievances to the extent of depriving a lot of newcomers of a road that is all important to them? Is it fair to the twenty-five taxpayers that signed the petition?

CLUB HOUSES DO AWAY WITH SHORTAGE

No More Does University Student Have Trouble to Find Living Place

For the first time in several years all the students attending the University from outside cities have been able to find rooming and boarding locations without difficulty. With college well under way all of the students are housed, and as a matter of fact this year there are a few prospective room renters who have been disappointed. The boys' dormitory, which provides for possibly 125 students, has never provided rooms for all the non-fraternity members, and the girls' dormitory cares for a much smaller proportion of the girls. There are twelve club houses, each of which contain from 10 to 20 students. The remainder of the 1000 students who are entered in the arts, science, literary or music departments must seek rooms and boarding places in private families. Several years the number of students was so large that there was a difficult time in locating themselves. The Y. M. C. A. of the University took upon itself the responsibility of securing sufficient locations, and every summer it makes a house to house canvass and then before school opens publishes the list of addresses and information in pamphlet form, which is given to the students as they arrive, without cost. Boarding places are more difficult to secure than rooms.

This year, with the addition of five new clubhouses and the city of Eugene having built several hundred new residences during the past year, there was no difficulty experienced. Clubhouses are a very popular form of living at the University, for not only is the cost of living made actually cheaper, but the advantages are numerous. When the boys organize a house they secure their own cook and servants. It has been found that in spite of the much more luxurious living that is available, the cost per individual member is considerably lower. Most of the clubs rent their houses, but several are owned by the organizations. When a house is bought, however, it is generally done with borrowed money, the interest on which takes the place of rent. The advantages of a house owned by a club is that it can be built to suit the organization's needs. One or two of the club houses, however, are free from debt. The new Kappa Sigma house which has just been built at a cost of \$10,000, and which is regarded as the finest residence in the city, has been built with money raised by subscription among the members, one of whom gave \$1000.

Among the new buildings which are needed at the University of Oregon and which will be the first to be constructed, is a girls' dormitory. There are far more girls living in private families than boys, and the dormitory or the sorority places them under the direct supervision of a "house mother."

IMPROVEMENT CLUB GOES AFTER P. E. & E.

Number of Bonus Subscribers Won't Pay Until Improvements Are Made

A sort of indignation meeting was held at the planning mill at Seventeenth and Willamette streets Saturday night by the South Eugene Improvement Club. The meeting was called for the purpose of taking steps to compel the P. E. & E. to improve the streets over which it has built the College Hill loop and to ask for better service. It was the sense of the meeting that the company was not entitled to collect the bonus until it completes its part of the contract. A number of subscribers have not paid their part and declare they will not do so until this is completed. There were some rather warm speeches at the meeting and the equipment as well as the service was censured. The outcome of the meeting was the appointment of a committee consisting of J. G. Wells, H. H. Wood and W. C. Lyons to wait upon the company and present these matters before its officials.

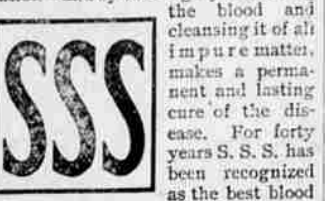

At the assessment and taxation meeting in this city last Saturday the discussion was quite spirited and in many respects instructive. After the opening statement by Chairman Dorning, the speakers were J. M. Shelley, T. H. Garrett, J. Beebe, R. Pappenburg, and others. Assessor Keeney, in his own defense, criticized the action of those signing the call for the meeting, characterizing many of them as tax-dodgers who were actuated solely by selfish motives. He said:

"This year is the first time an assessor has dared to put assessments where they belong. And I venture the assertion that taxes in Lane county today are more equitable than they ever were before."

Mr. Keeney told the method of assessments, and added that assessments are continually being raised as the assessor learns more about what property the tax-payer has. "You have twice elected me to be assessor of this county. I have tried to do my duty according to the laws of the state. I tell you, as long as you permit me to act as assessor, I shall continue to assess at the true cash value. "There is talk of recalling me. What good will that do you? The assessment will stand if I should be taken from office, and you would have to elect another man in my place. Then, if he did his duty, he would do just what I have done."

Charles J. Galloway, member of the state tax commission, who was present, explained that the law required the assessment of property at its true cash value. And "true cash value" is defined as the price that could be realized, not at forced sale, but in the ordinary course of business. The only question that only concerns taxpayers and assessor is uniformity of assessment. By comparing the sale price of lands with the assessed valuations of the same they are able to get at the ratio the assessor uses and can therefore a portion justly among the counties the burden of running the state. The work of the commission is much the same as of similar bodies in other states. This commission assesses the railroads and similar corporations, directing each county what value to compile in its taxes. Senator I. H. Bingham also spoke on the assessment law and the objects for which the state tax commission was authorized.
