SENATOR ALDRICH NOT BADLY HURT

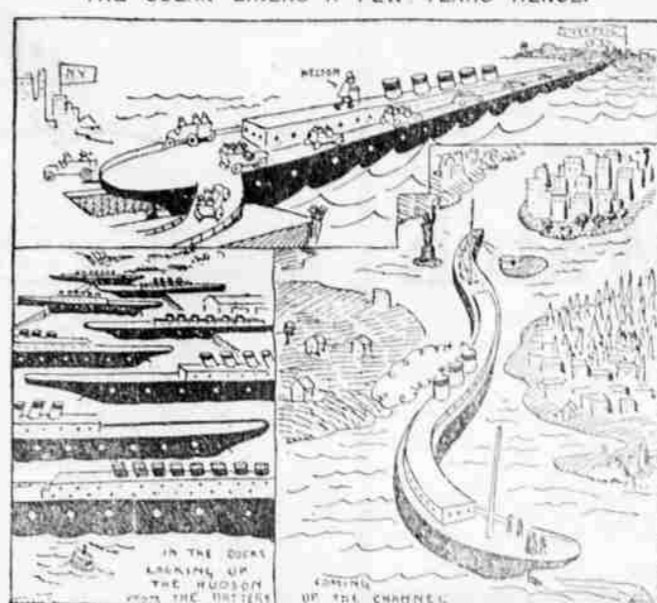

CORPORATION MAN IS OUT AGAINST OSWALD WEST FOR NEXT TERM CIRCUIT COURT

Interesting Story in Connection With Flop of Attorney Medley

Jay Bowerman's press agent sends a dispatch to the Oregonian from Cottage Grove in reporting the meeting of the assembly candidates for governor at that place in which he says:

Democrats Voice Protest

"We are supporting Mr. Bowerman not because we are disloyal to the democratic party, but as a protest against the prostitution of our party to the selfish interests of Jonathan Bourne, whose creature in this campaign is Oswald West," was the explanation made at Cottage Grove by J. S. Medley, prominent lawyer and party leader in Lane.

"For twenty-five years I have been a democrat," said Mr. Medley, "and I intend to remain a democrat for twenty years more. But on November 8 I am going to cast my vote for Jay Bowerman. I shall do so feeling that I am voting for a worthy man, but my particular object shall be to register my disapproval of Bourne, who, through West, is seeking to perpetuate himself in the senate of the United States as a misrepresentative from Oregon."

"West is a nice young fellow. I think the world of him personally, and we have long been good friends. But I cannot countenance the use to which, as head of the democratic party, he is now being put by the cunning politician who seeks to gain control of the office of governor for use in his own behalf."

And thereby brings a telegraph. J. S. Medley, the democrat quoted above, is attorney for the Oregon & Southeastern Railroad company, which operates a short line of railroad from Cottage Grove to the foot of the Bohemia mountains. Something over a year ago an accident occurred on this road, through the breaking down of a rotten bridge, and several persons were badly injured and crippled for life.

Naturally, the railroad company is very much out by the heavy judgments secured against them, so much so, in fact, that it is alleged in papers filed in court by Foster and Hall that the company is purposely having its bondholders foreclose and sell the property, so that the injured men will be unable to collect the judgments they were awarded in court.

J. S. Medley no doubt shares the feelings of the railroad corporation, for which he is attorney, and his resentment against Mr. West and his fellow members in the Oregon state railroad commission is deep seated. Had they been less active, and had the warning to the company that its bridges were rotten never been given, probably the jury would not have awarded such heavy damages to the injured men. Medley cannot support the man who attempted, as a public official, to force his client corporation to spend money on improvements in order to properly safeguard the lives of its passengers. Such a man as West, who has, as railroad commissioner, been more concerned over the rights and welfare of the public than the corporation would not be as safe a man for executive of the state as Mr. Bowerman, who is

LIBEL CASE BRIEFS FILED IN SUPREME COURT TODAY

Famous Suit in Which Several Prominent Men Are Figuring

TAFT'S BROTHER WAS CHARGED WITH GRAFTING

President Roosevelt Ordered Department of Justice to Bring Criminal Action

Washington, Oct. 21.—Briefs on behalf of the government and Press Publishing Company of New York, were filed in the supreme court of the United States today, in what is termed the Panama libel case. The case is that in which former President Roosevelt ordered the department of justice to proceed against the publishers of the New York World because of the publication of stories to the effect that there was favoritism in the purchase of the Panama canal property by which certain capitalists, including Charles F. Taft, brother of the president, Douglas Robinson, brother-in-law of Colonel Roosevelt, and others, were charged with having reaped great financial benefit.

WILL RECOGNIZE PORTUGUESE REPUBLIC

Berlin, Oct. 21.—Great Britain has proposed that all the powers recognize the republic of Portugal at the same time. Germany has replied, approving the plan.

Lisbon, Oct. 21.—Monsignor Tonti, papal nuncio at Lisbon, today left Portugal, but his destination was not announced. It had been rumored that the Pope had decided to recall the nuncio as a protest against the anti-clerical attitude of the republic.

JIM HILL'S BIG FARMER, SHAW, COMING TO EUGENE

MURDERER TAKEN FROM PRISON BY FRIENDS

Friends of John Moore Rescue Him From the Electric Chair

Livingston, Va., Oct. 21.—Mountaineer friends of John Moore, under sentence to be electrocuted for the murder of Frank Howel, descended upon the Nelson county jail early this morning, stormed the building and rescued the prisoner. It is supposed he will be taken to the mountains and liberated.

It was some hours after the rescue that the news spread and deputy sheriffs were on the way into the mountains to try to arrest Moore. It was feared that blood shed will result from the attempt.
