### EUGENE BUSINESS MEN TO VISIT SPRINGFIELD TOMORROW FORENOON

First Car Will Run Over New P. E. & E. Bridge, and Delegation Will Be Welcomed

Promptly at 10 o'clock tomorrow morning four streetcars filled with members of the Eugene Commercial club and all business men who can get away will leave the Commercial club building for Springfield. The cars bearing the Eugene party will cross the new Springfield bridge for the first time and proceed north on Mill street to Main street. Turning, they will run to the end of the track at the Southern Pacific crossing in front of the Springfield city hall where the entire membership of the Commercial club of that city will be awaiting them. This club meets tonight to arrange for a big program of entertainment for the delegation from Eugene, and the true "Coming of the Railroad" will be celebrated. The cars will remain in the mill city probably twenty minutes and will then return to Eugene. The party will have been gone about an hour and a quarter.

Springfield is planning a return call and the Commercial club will charter the streetcars either Saturday evening or Monday evening and spend an hour or so here as the guests of Eugene. It is planned to make considerable of the first step toward the uniting of the two cities, and the good will that is noticeable on both sides is a favorable omen. An effort is being made to secure a band to accompany the cars into Springfield tomorrow morning.

### TOTAL NUMBER OF VOTERS REGISTERED IN LANE COUNTY 5896
