BIG STREET FRUIT SHOW COMES TO CLOSE

Prizes Awarded to Exhibitors—
J. Beebe, Fruit Inspector, Wins Honors

The first annual apple show in Eugene is over, but already plans are being laid for the next year's show, which, all who are involved with the responsibility, declare will double the success of this year in every respect. The first annual apple show was a big success, and even though the number of exhibits was small, the quality of the fruit was so high and uniform that the judges for a time feared they had encountered a hopeless undertaking. Every one is proud of Lane county's apples, and even the skeptical realize this is the real home of the fruit. It was interesting to stand about any one of the exhibits and to keep record of the various, more or less enthusiastic, remarks of the passersby. The matter of packing apples is not generally known to Lane county farmers, and this exhibit was very instructive to many.

Three more competent judges could not have been secured than Prof. Chas. A. Cole, of O. A. C. E. R. Lake, in the service of the Horticultural department at Washington; and George Taylor, formerly in the service of the same department and also former fruit inspector at Medford. The decisions were made regarding color, formation and uniformity. J. Beebe, county fruit inspector, won the largest number of prizes, winning the grand first prize, and a \$15 and a \$10 third and fourth prize. The following is the list of awards.
