

POPULAR AND ABLE LEADER OF MEXICAN LIBERAL PARTY TO HEAD REVOLUTION

Eagle Pass, Texas, Nov. 21.—"General Bernardo Reyes is coming." This is the whisper that has gone with telegraphic swiftness up and down the Rio Grande.

General Reyes was once a business friend of Diaz, and is now said to be an exile from his country. He was sent a year ago to Paris on a military mission, and since then no word came from him until today, when the cautious words were sent from Matamoros to Las Vacas.

Washington, Nov. 21.—Belated telegrams reaching the state department from officials in Mexico, mention various revolutionary disturbances in different parts of the country, but all agree in one respect, and that is that the Diaz government is strong enough to repress the revolutionists.

DEALERS IN STOCK ARRESTED FOR BIG FRAUDS

Burr Brothers' Offices Raided by Federal Officials Today

New York, Nov. 21.—Federal officers today raided the offices of the Burr Brothers, a corporation dealing in stocks and other securities. The raid was made on a warrant charging use of the mails to defraud investors, and the postoffice officials say the concern sold to investors at par between \$40,000,000 and \$50,000,000 of stocks in various companies, most of which have gone out of existence or become bankrupt.

The raid was carried out under the personal supervision of Postmaster General Hitchcock and Robt. Sharp, chief postoffice inspector. The books and papers were seized and the following officers were arrested: Sheldon G. Burr, president; Eugene M. Burr, secretary and treasurer.

RAILROADS FIGHT REDUCTION OF FREIGHT RATES

Motion to Make the Injunction Permanent is Argued Today

San Francisco, Nov. 21.—Before Judge Gilbert, Ross and Morrow, en banc, in the United States circuit court, argument was made today on the motion to make permanent the injunction forbidding the interstate commerce commission to reduce the freight rates on certain commodities to Missouri river points and Oregon, Washington and Arizona.
