SIGMA CHI WILL TRY TO ADVANCE SCHOLARSHIP STANDARD

Banquet Had for Conference Between Fraternity and Faculty

At the Sigma Chi smoker at the former Khoda Kahn house Friday night a number of the University faculty were present to form a cooperative plan between the professors and the fraternity students to help raise the standard of scholarship in this fraternity. It is well known that the scholarship of fraternity men is low in comparison with that of the average student, and the Sigma Chi is endeavoring and is actually succeeding in raising the standard. There is a province head over half a dozen chapters who keeps in touch with the faculty. The grades of the students are reported periodically to him. Besides this, competitive contests are held between the district chapters for the best average of grades. For instance, the Sigma Chi chapter at Washington will endeavor to outdo the chapter here or at California. The individual men in the club also compete with one another.

John S. McMillan, who is the province head of this district, outlined the proposition, and also told an interesting story of the famous Purdue fraternity case, where that University made an unsuccessful effort to abolish the fraternity. In the courts, to which the case was carried before it was decided. O. M. P. Jamison, father of Homer and Harper Jamison, who are members of the new fraternity here, was attending Purdue at that time and took an active part, and also spoke. Professors Glen, Straub and Barker were the faculty members present.

The installation services were held in the Woodmen hall Saturday. A characteristic feature of the Sigma Chi installation is the fact that the customary roughness in initiation has been abolished. The banquet was held at the Osburn in the evening and concluded the installation.

CHRYSANTHEMUM SHOW AT CRESWELL A SUCCESS

Creswell, Nov. 26.—Creswell's first chrysanthemum show was held in the Commercial club rooms Tuesday evening and was a success. An admission fee of 10 cents was charged, and ice cream and candy booths were conducted by the Ladies' Aid

society. A fine display of chrysanthemums was made. Mrs. M. J. Hillgas secured first and second prizes; one of her flowers measuring 23 inches in circumference. Among the blooms on exhibition was a green chrysanthemum exhibited by Mrs. R. O. Brady. Mrs. J. H. Martin was awarded the first prize on the best bouquet, and Mrs. R. O. Brady second.

WELBY STEVENS GROWS PERSIMMONS

Springfield, Nov. 26.—What cannot be grown in Springfield seems yet to be discovered. Welby Stevens this morning was handing to his friends ripe persimmons, which he has grown on his place north of the city. The tree on which they grew is only a few inches in diameter, but he has already picked over two bushels. One visitor, when shown the tree, and who was a recent arrival from the middle west, exclaimed: "Why, this state must be just like Missouri." The tree bears every year and the fruit is of an excellent quality. It has a sweet taste when ripe, but which is very puckering before matured.

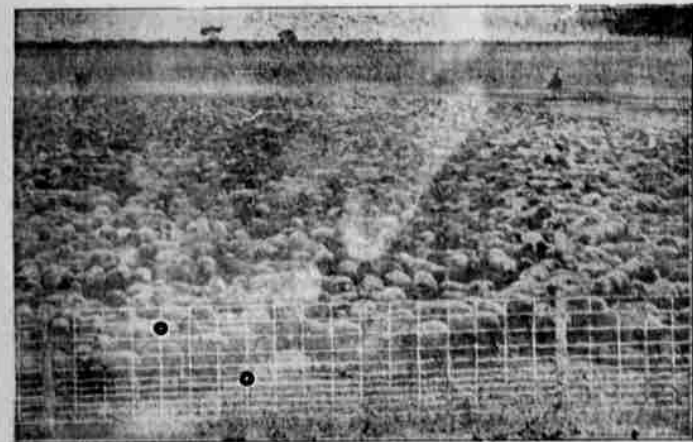
