THE INCREASING SOCIALIST VOTE

It is curious to note that in the recent congressional elections the Socialist vote in the United States increased largely. In fact, in three important states—New York, California and Wisconsin—the Socialist vote was more than twice that of the presidential election of 1908. In sixteen states the Socialists polled 396,200 votes, compared with 251,257 votes two years ago. In the Milwaukee district Victor Berger was elected to congress, the first Socialist to sit in an American congress. In this connection may be contrasted the voting that is now going on in the British elections, where the Socialists have lost several seats and where the vote is very much smaller than it was several years ago. The Socialist vote in Great Britain never amounted to anything until several supreme court decisions were registered against the labor unions, curtailing certain privileges which they had assumed for many years. The liberal government of England has gone far toward over-riding these decisions by new legislation, replacing matters as they were before, hence the decline in the Socialist vote.

When people see a hope of amending the present system of society they are not inclined to be ultra-radical in their political opinions, but when no reasonable hope is entertained or seems possible of attainment, it is then that the Socialist is evolved.

The statement credited to Traffic Manager Kruttschnitt, of

the S. P. Co., that trains would be running over the Natron extension to San Francisco by the end of the present fiscal year, is ridiculous. We cannot believe that he was correctly reported, because it is doubtful if the present contracts can be completed by that time. Then there are at least seventy miles, or more, through the heart of the Cascade mountains, for which the contracts have not even been let. More rapid progress will have to be made in the future than in the past to insure the completion of the Natron cut-off in two years more.

The Eugene water department shows receipts for the past month of over \$800 in excess of all operating expenses, and when the municipal power plant is completed this net income will be increased by several hundred dollars monthly. The power plant will also furnish the city its lights at cost, and there will still be a surplus to sell to private consumers, and tend to reduce the excessive rates for light and power now being charged by the private corporation monopoly.

What is the use to talk about the issues that divide the two great political parties, when a Republican president appoints a Southern Democrat chief justice of the United States?

The verdict of "not proven" in the bribery charge against Senator "Bill" Lorimer, of Illinois, only makes more popular the "Oregon plan" of electing United States senators.

REVIVAL MEETINGS WILL COME TO CLOSE NEXT MONDAY

Probably 250 or 300 Persons Have Taken Stand for Christ

The revival services being conducted at the tabernacle will close next Monday evening, according to announcement made by Dr. Stough last evening. The evangelist said that while it cannot be definitely ascertained how many have taken their stand for Christ during the present campaign, the number is probably between 250 and 300. This is considered very gratifying, and the number will no doubt be greatly increased during the closing week of the campaign.

Tomorrow afternoon at 2:30 Dr. Stough will preach at the Fairmount Presbyterian church. Friday afternoon a special service will be held for the aged people of the community, and Sunday afternoon there will be a great mass meeting for men.
