trifling pump that is part of the new equipment. This was granted. Streetcar Company Again

The street committee reported that it had used 17,228 feet of lumber, and of this 5780 is for private use and will be returned to the city. At this time Street Commissioner Turner made a complaint against the streetcar company, declaring that many of the streets along the car line are actually impassable, especially on Alder street and East Thirteenth street. The approach to the bridge, where a woman was injured a few weeks ago, was brought up and this will probably be widened to the width of the street. The matter of refunding M. M. Davis for taxes on property that he will dedicate to the city was mentioned.

The finance committee read the usual number of bills, after which C. B. Rickman again presented his bill against the city on the claim that the contract which he took was larger than he or the city expected. The city attorney expressed his view that Rickman had absolutely no legal claim. Rickman then declared that this sum was due him as services in being instrumental in securing for the city a valuable piece of land and other things. Mr. Rickman declared that the council was beating him out of \$250 and appeared quite injured.

More Streetcar Company

Here the question was raised as to whether the streetcar company could be made to pay for changes in the street grade that had been made to accommodate its tracks. Under the present assessment the property owners alone have been assessed. This has reference to a part of Willamette street near the old baseball grounds. It was placed in the hands of the city attorney, with the instruction to determine whether or not there is any possibility to collect anything from the company.

A petition for an arc light at the corner of East Fifteenth and Hilyard streets was referred to the fire and water committee. A petition for sidewalks on Hilyard and East Ninth streets, was presented.

An assessment of \$22.50 against property owned by Little Kendall on West Seventh street was cancelled because of an agreement in regard to the opening of a street. The recorder was ordered to issue duplicates of warrants that have been lost in being sent to Waltherville.

W. S. Moon for Councilman

After the acceptance of the resignation of R. B. Henderson a petition was read from a number of residents in the second ward asking that the council appoint in his place, W. S. Moon. This was filed but no action taken because Mr. Henderson's resignation does not take effect until December 31.

Council Wants Post Lights

install a different lighting system on the business streets, whether or not he would change the present arc light rates to other parts of the city for no additional cost. The fact that this contract was to be for only a year did not incline the manager to offer too much and from this the question wandered aimlessly to a number of points. It showed the mayor and council much in favor of the post and cluster system of street lamps, and the possibilities of having all light poles taken off Willamette street was mentioned. Mr. Spencer made a proposition to furnish all the city's incandescent lights, such as in the city hall, in the park, in the alley intersections and in the bridges for a flat rate of \$32. The lights at the filter plant are to be provided free. This was accepted by the council.

The residents and property owners of Hill Crest asked for a fire hydrant at the corner of Beacon street and Eugene avenue. This was granted. At this time the mayor asked about the "dead ends" in the water pipes about the city, expressing himself very much opposed to their existence. He was told that what few there were of necessity were flushed once each month.

The matter of having the city boundaries described by metes and bounds, rather than the present system that depends upon the location of certain river channels was also discussed.

The street committee was ordered to investigate the drain that carried the water under the railroad embankment in Fairmount. At present there is a 18-inch iron pipe, that has several times become filled and the surrounding property flooded during the recent rains.

The meeting adjourned until Wednesday night.

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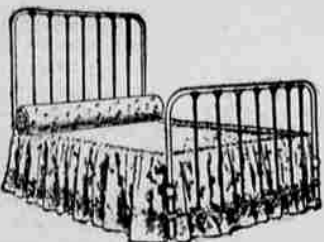

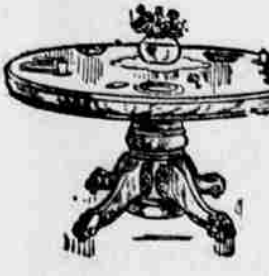
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
