EUGENE MEN WILL PLANT BIGGEST WALNUT ORCHARD IN STATE

Falls City, Or., Dec. 28.—The recent purchase of the 250-acre Hart ranch, two miles southeast of this city, by A. D. and J. R. James of Eugene, is one of the largest recent transactions. The new owners have made contracts for planting and cultivating 5000 English walnut trees and 5000 cherry trees. This will give back county the largest walnut orchard in the state. The development of this orchard will be under the supervision of an expert orchardist and work will be begun at once.
