## NEWS OF INTEREST TO THE FARMER

### POULTRY PRODUCTS HIGH.

Poultry products have trebled in price during the last few years, and yet the supply is far short of the demand. As the price of grain goes up, so also does the price of the poultry products advance, and today there is more profit in a dozen eggs or a pound of poultry than there was when everything was cheap, and besides, as the public gradually learns the value of eggs and poultry as food, the demand gets better. Eggs and chickens will be high this year, and it rests almost entirely with ourselves whether or not we are among those who can help supply the demand.

Our hens will not lay unless they get attention, and our chickens will not be fat unless they get good food.

### FARM NOTES.

L. L. Swan, of Albany, Oregon, is an attorney. He is also an agriculturist. In addition he is a practical farmer. He owns a fine farm out near Prichard, which is a few miles south of Brownsville. Here he has some high-class registered Jerseys, some of which he purchased from the Ross Nelson sale, which took place last May. These are augmented by stock rich in the blood of the Carnation and Stoke Poles families. Mr. Swan takes one-third of the grain as his share on his farm, which is rented. Last year his share amounted to 125 bushels and 12 pounds of vetch and wheat, which sold for 80 cents per bushel, total \$109.12; 275 bushels and 13 pounds white wheat at 85 cents, total \$278.12; oats at 10 cents, total \$27.81; hay sold for \$12.49. There is about 185 acres in cultivation out of the 240 acres, and reckoning the value of his land at the current price in that neighborhood, Mr. Swan realized 6 per

cent on his investment. Does farming pay in the Willamette valley? The senior grand champion prize-winning heifer at the 1910 interstate fair at Spokane was compelled to submit to slaughter a few days ago as a result of having been found infected with tuberculosis. She belonged to the herd of cows at the University of Idaho agricultural experiment station, having been purchased from a Holstein breeder near Spokane, who is very careful with his cattle and has them tested twice a year. At the time she was purchased she was in a good healthy condition, but she was housed in one of the old frame barns there which had been the home of several cattle in previous years that had been affected with the dread disease. The building was thought to have been perfectly clean of any germs of the disease, as it had been thoroughly renovated some time previous. The animal was valued at over \$700, such a sum having been refused for her early last fall. Her name was Alta Posch Abbecker.

Are all the tools from screw-driver to thrashing machine, snugly housed for the winter? They should be, but if not it is not too late to bring them in yet. Better do it now.

One of the best tools a farmer can have is a good riveter for mending leather straps of all kinds. One of these will save a good many trips to town and maybe more than one runaway.

Look after the pits where potatoes and the like are stored, and make sure that there is enough earth or litter on them to protect the contents from the coldest weather. Neglect may cause serious loss.

Elmira, Jan. 2.—Will you please publish the following request, which we hope will be a benefit to the farmers throughout Lane county? We want to hear from every farmer's telephone line in the county, and find what arrangements they have made with the Pacific States Telephone company for switch privileges. They are demanding of us \$5.00 for each phone, and a majority of our stockholders will not pay it. Two years ago the telephone company's agent at Eugene claimed they were losing 98 cents on every farmer's phone at one dollar, (a price of their own making). So they jumped from one dollar to \$7.20 and then fell back to five dollars, and we offer then three dollars making up the loss of 98 cents. We think that is enough. What say you all? The telephone is the greatest of all inventions for the people of the country, but we don't think it necessary to make a lot of millions just for the sake of the convenience of the telephone. Let us hear from you as soon as possible through the papers or otherwise. The farmers should act in unison in this matter because a wrong to one is an injury to all.

### POSTAL SAVINGS BANKS OPEN TODAY

Washington, Jan. 3.—The first working day of the new year finds the Post Office Department busy inaugurating the postal banks, which have been agitated for so long by certain members of both branches of Congress in behalf of their constituents. The banks open today in a number of cities throughout the country, selected by the Department for experimental tests. Regulations, forms and instructions were mailed to postmasters several days ago, so that all might be ready for business today. Each state and territory has one office to receive deposits with a view to testing the system which has been devised.

Postmaster - General Hitchcock said today that special care had been taken in selecting post offices with postmasters whose records were excellent in starting the test. The officers are all of the second class, in localities where conditions are favorable for the development of the postal bank business. Many of the officers are located where foreigners reside who remit considerable money to relatives in their native lands.

## EUGENE MAY GET POSTAL SAVINGS BANK SOON

Postmaster Page Thinks This City Will Secure Second One in State

Eugene will probably have a postal savings bank within two or three months, according to a statement made by Postmaster Page this morning. Only one of two are to be established in a state at first in order that the plan may be tried out, and it is expected that Eugene will be one of these points. The first postal savings bank in the state was to have been opened at Klamath Falls today, but this opening will probably be delayed a week, owing to the failure of the necessary printed blanks and books to arrive. The purpose of selecting this southern Oregon point for the first location was to catch the money if possible that is being sent out of this country by the thousands of dollars by foreign laborers that are employed by the railroad companies in construction work. It is thought that the foreign laborers would as soon trust the money to the postoffice as they would to buy the money orders by which they send it to the old country.

It is thought that Eugene will be the second point to secure such a bank on account of the many foreign laborers on the Natron extension.
