Today 80 married couples are each viewing their friends with suspicion and the dance topic is one requiring delicate hands. The married people, however, declared that they will not be outdone by the younger set in social plans and that the event of this week was only postponed at a late hour, because of an unexpected emergency.

BUILDING OPERATIONS

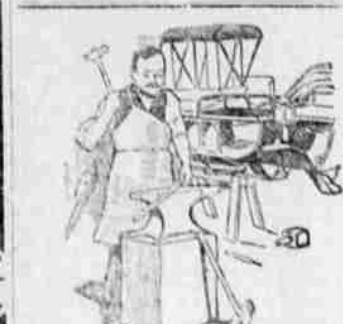

ATTEMPT TO BRIBE
NEW YORK PAPER

One Hundred Thousand Dollars
Offered for One Editorial

Washington, Jan. 26.—Revelation of attempts to buy the editorial support of the New York Journal of Commerce in favor of ship subsidy legislation, which that paper has consistently opposed, was made to the house ship subsidy investigating committee today by Alfred W. Dodsworth, business manager of the paper.

Earlier in the day Paul G. Fournier, representing the Uranium Steamship company, against which the so-called London Conference lines, controlling what is alleged to be 98 per cent of the Atlantic passenger traffic, are arrayed, told how railroad authorities in this country, notably the Central Passenger association at Chicago, had refused to sell tickets routed over independent lines unless the independents obtained the sanction of the conference lines.

A \$100,000 bribe offered as a result of the conference lines. Dodsworth's brother, worth, editor of the paper, will be called to explain why he is on the committee.

Alfred W. Dodsworth testified that his paper had never been subsidized by any interests. But about six years ago a person came into his office and offered to pay the Journal of Commerce \$100,000, taking 1,000 copies of his paper, for the insertion of an article in one issue supporting ship subsidy legislation. This man refused to disclose his identity unless his proposition were to be accepted. Mr. Dodsworth said he immediately called his brother, John W., into his office as a witness to the conversation and the proposition was declined.

TWO MASKED MEN ROB ELECTRIC TRAIN

Spectacular Hold-up Occurs
Last Night Near Los
Angeles

Los Angeles, Jan. 26.—Yelling like Indian warriors and firing revolvers with both hands, two masked men boarded an inbound beach suburban car on the outskirts of Santa Monica shortly after 6 o'clock tonight, and seriously wounding one of them, were routed and forced to flee by a single shot.

This shot wounded one of the robbers in the cheek, and he was captured at 9:30 o'clock, when he boarded a car to come to the city for medical treatment. The wound in his cheek betrayed him.

When brought to the county jail here he gave the name of Roy Fox and said he was 19 years old. He refused to give any information concerning the identity of his companion.

His companion escaped in the brush, and is being hunted tonight by a sheriff's posse. It is thought he will be captured before morning.

Harry Mitchell of Santa Monica, who was wounded in the fusillade, was shot in the neck. His injuries were pronounced serious by the surgeons of the receiving hospital here. Herbert Harman, the man who shot him, was struck by a bullet which pierced his coat, and fell harmlessly into his vest pocket.

LETTERS WERE NOT
FORGED, AS ALLEGED

Los Angeles, Jan. 27.—Supplied with enlarged photographs of various letters, Theodore Kytk, a handwriting expert of San Francisco, was placed on the stand today by the defense in the Baldwin will contest, and declared that all letters which Mrs. Lillian Ashby Turnbull had declared were forgeries were in her own handwriting.

All the letters were addressed to James R. Wood, the Boston detective, who played a prominent part in Mrs. Turnbull's former suit against the late millionaire turfman. Wood was on the stand before Kytk was called, and he identified the letters as genuine, although Mrs. Turnbull, in her testimony asserted that they had been "doctored" or tampered with by him.

All the letters relate to Mrs. Turnbull's association with Baldwin in 1892, and when introduced, Mrs. Turnbull's action for \$75,000 against him in 1896, helped the turfman to win the court decision.
