BASEBALL OUTLOOK AT UNIVERSITY IS GOOD THIS SEASON

Although as yet the University of Oregon has not selected a baseball coach, the 'Varsity enthusiasts are planning much for the coming season, and the prediction generally stands that Oregon will have a better team this season than last year, and for several years. A good portion of last year's team is on hand for a nucleus for the 1911 line, and there is some cracking good material on hand to fill the places of Bud Clarke, and Henkle and other veterans who will not be seen this year.

The coach will be chosen Tuesday night by the executive committee. There is little doubt expressed upon the outcome of their decision, for "Dollie" Gray, of Portland, Columbia's star coach, is thought to have the best chance out of several candidates. The faculty has objections to Tom Kelly, the coach of the past few seasons, who became very popular with the team, and there is not much chance that Ford Henkle, last year's southpaw, who played with Seattle later in the season, can fill the job. Henkle, however, still has open his position on the Seattle team for next year, and as he will train with Oregon team his knowledge of the game will be equally exchanged for what training he can get.

Of the old men on hand is the veteran athlete, "Chuck" Taylor, played here the Dallas team scored a victory over the Portage team, of Wisconsin, last night by the score of 25 to 23. Dallas took the lead at the start and held it throughout the first half. At one time the score stood 8 to 2 in favor of Dallas.

The score at the end of the first half was 13 to 10 in favor of Dallas. In the second half both teams entered the game with renewed energy, and the result was in doubt until the very last. The score never varied more than two or three points during the last half. Portage got the lead only one time by one point.

The Portage team was much heavier than the Dallas team, but the passing of the local boys was superior. For Dallas Hallantyne threw five field goals, Ned Shaw three, Rice one. For Portage Schneider threw four field goals, Sheppard two and Sweeney two. Dallas got seven out of eight from the foul line, and Portage seven out of ten.
