PORTAGE TEAM WINS

EASILY FROM OREGON

Run Up Score of 38 to 15—
Freshmen Walloped the
High School Team

With the overwhelming score of 38 to 15 the Portage, Wis., champion basketball slingers outplayed the University of Oregon team in every department of the game last night, in one of the fastest, and incidentally one of the roughest contests ever seen in this city. Quick as cats, the champions of last year worked with the ball, and although the University squad at times showed out above the brilliant playing of the veterans, it could be seen that Oregon's show was nil. The visitors made all their baskets from a distance and their guarding was as near perfect as possible. Trainer Hayward declares that he is satisfied with the work of his team. The Oregon men possibly lost many opportunities to score by losing their temper at unnecessary roughness and taunts with which the trained players baited them. An enormous crowd saw the game.

As a preliminary the freshmen outclassed the Eugene High school by a 54 to 2 score.

Portage, stung by the two defeats by Dallas, played a terrific game against O. A. C., defeating the fast five of that college 44 to 14.

OREGON MAY TAKE PART IN WRESTLING TOURNEY

It is probable that the University of Oregon will have two or three entries in the Amateur Athletic union championship wrestling meet to be held in Portland next March under the auspices of the Multnomah Athletic Club. Many of the best amateur mat artists in the country compete each year in this big tournament. Last year the meet was held in Chicago.

SPANISH WAR BURIAL LOT BILL PASSES THE HOUSE

Plot in Riverview Cemetery in Portland Will Be Purchased

Salem, Or., Jan. 30.—House bill No. 23, which appropriates \$4000 for the purchase of a burial plot in the Riverview cemetery in Portland for veterans of the Spanish war, passed in the house this morning. It was introduced by Eggleston, of Jackson. Steelhammer and Johnson, of Marion, bitterly assailed the bill, which they termed public extravagance, and Huntington, of Douglas county, who received a big socialist vote at the last election, tried hard to have the bill defeated.

Feats, of Multnomah county, who was a member of the Second Oregon regiment, made an eloquent plea for the passage of the bill. His speech was the best heard on the floor of the house at this session, and he was applauded by both the members and galleries. The bill was passed by a vote of 38 to 15.

SPRINGFIELD

ANOTHER BRICK OR CONCRETE BUILDING

Springfield, Jan. 31.—Another brick or concrete building proposed for Main street is a warehouse that will be built for E. E. Morrison & Co. as soon as the weather permits. This will be some 30 by 40 feet in dimensions and will merely add to the length of the concrete building now occupied by the store. Chas. Rivett, the owner, contemplates the use of brick for this structure. E. E. Morrison & Co. have added a hardware department to their furniture stock, and are now crowded for room in spite of the fact that they have nearly the largest store in town. Mr. Rivett has already constructed two concrete buildings on Main street within the past two years.

KIRKLAND'S ESTATE AMOUNTS TO \$9000

Springfield, Jan. 31.—Some \$9000 will be left to the daughters of Arthur Kirkland, the eccentric Scotchman who died in Springfield a few weeks ago. The appraisers, B. A. Washburn, John Bell and Mark Perry, finished their work yesterday. The Kirkland estate is valued at \$7,009. This includes 500 acres south-west of Eugene, near Lorane, two houses and three lots in Springfield, and an acre and a house in West Springfield, in addition to other realty. He also carried \$2000 life insurance with the Woodmen of the World. This is bequeathed by his will to his two daughters.

Springfield, Jan. 31.—Miss Ida Walker underwent a dangerous surgical operation in Eugene yesterday for appendicitis, but is now resting easily and is out of danger, providing complications do not set in.

HARRISBURG EXPECTS NEW BRIDGE THIS YEAR

Harrisburg, Or., Jan. 31.—J. T. Butler, a member of the board of county commissioners, was here a few days ago looking into the matter of the proposed bridge across the Willamette river. He is of the opinion that the project is a very simple one and it would require only a short time to complete the work. He thought a suspension bridge would be the proper structure for this place, and with the low approaches which would be required, the cost of construction would not exceed \$40,000. He has the supervision of all bridge work in Lane county, and can do the work at a minimum cost, the steel being the greatest expense. Owing to the fact that the county has no other large bridge to construct this year, it is thought the preliminaries can be arranged at once and the bridge built this year.

MARX DRY CLEANING

The art of Dry Cleaning is comparatively new, and is misunderstood by a great part of the public. Much of the so-called Dry Cleaning is "dry" but not "cleaning."

The inferior work is the result of the method employed by many small places who have no machinery or proper equipment for doing the work and consists merely in brushing the material, either by hand or with a small apparatus (so-called vacuum cleaning), and sponging the surface with a liquid other than water. This goods to some extent, but leaves all the dirt and grease on the reverse side and in the center of the cloth, and in the case of coats, jackets and other lined garments, the dirt is left in the inter-lining, padding, etc., and in a short time will work out to the surface and the garment is as soiled looking as it was before it was cleaned.

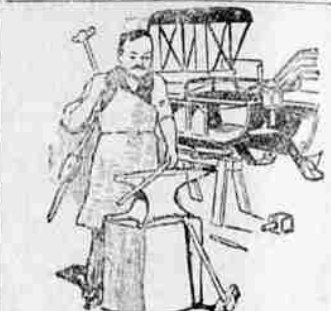

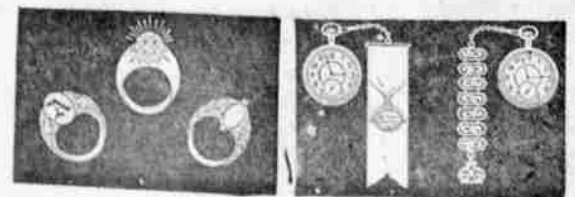
