According to the old timers in this section, Lawson amused himself in the early days of this country by shooting up saloons and making the uninitiated tenderfoot dance to the whistle of bullets. For years he had lived the life of a recluse on the place where he died.

S. P. CO. LINE FROM VALE TO HEPPNER

Portland, Or., Jan. 31.—Construction of an extension of the present line from Ontario to Vale in Eastern Oregon through the central portion of the state, with a connection with one of the roads now operating south from the Columbia river, possibly at Heppner, is reported to be the move planned by the Harriman interests of shortening the present line between Portland and its Eastern connections, and of reducing the running time of fast trains between this city and the Oregon Short Line from five to six hours.

When Julius Kruttschnitt, director of maintenance and operation of the Union Pacific and Southern Pacific systems, was in Oregon a few weeks ago he made a trip over the present road from Ontario to Vale and viewed the possibilities of an extension through the famous John Day valley.
