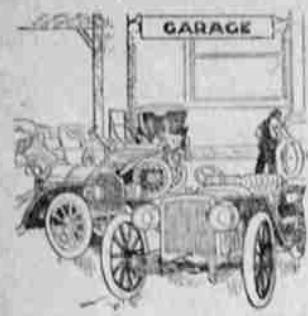

IN THE JUNGLES

OF TAXATION

Editor Guard: I have been a reader of your paper for some time. I find in its columns many things of interest. If I may be permitted to have a little space, I will write a few lines for the consideration of your readers.

There has been much said and written in regard to the high and unreasonable charges made by the telephone companies, exorbitant freight rates and burdensome county tax. It is evident the people, like the children of Israel, are oppressed by that monster called "tax," and many seem to think that King Rehoboam reigns over our land. This is not true, however, for we live under no king, but in the land of the free—a land where we are so fortunate as to be plenty.

We who are so fortunate as to have a home in Lane county, with her fertile valleys and pine-covered hills, would have no reason to complain were it not that the dread monster, "tax," grows more and more exacting each year. That we are burdened with heavy taxes is evident, but groaning and complaining will not help us. If we would take a look into the jungle of our system of taxes, we could see the cause. First, the way our real property is taxed. The commissioners make the valuation on a farm without looking

over the land, but price it in general. What do they know about this land; the quality of the soil; how much good free soil, how much white or dobe, how much waste by rocks and sloughs?

The writer knows of some land which has but little free soil, and poorly improved, that was assessed at one hundred dollars per acre while another tract adjoining this with good improvements and somewhat nearer town, was assessed at \$65 per acre. I am informed of another tract for which the owner said he refused \$100 per acre which was assessed for only \$5. So we see the injustice of the present system.

Would it not be better to have three or five appraisers appointed or elected to grade this land and appraise it according to the grade and location? The value would increase as towns would spring up or when timber land is cleared.

By another search in the jungles we find money in the form of notes secured by deeds in escrow. It has been but a few days since the writer saw four notes of \$800 each which had escaped the gaze of the assessor; in fact, there must be many notes of such kind hidden back in the jungles.

If I have \$10,000 in the form of notes, and you have the same amount in land, why should I not pay the same tax as you do?

I am told the assessor cannot find all of these notes. The jungles that hide these notes and all papers expressing value could easily be cleared away by enacting a law requiring the assessor's signature on the back of a note, showing it had been assessed before it could be collected. Let the note be considered as other personal property and be governed in regard to date as such. Much more might be said on this subject and much might be said to clear away those dark corners and make the burden of tax fall more equal on all. More anon.

And for a decree partitioning the said property according to the rights of respective parties or if a partition cannot be had without a material injury to those rights, that the premises be sold and the proceeds applied: 1st, to the payment of the principal of this mortgage and the interest thereon, and expenses of the sale; and 2nd, to the payment of the expenses of the partition of title, and 3rd, to the payment of the interest of Alice Baker, less her pro rata of the said expenses, and for such other and further relief as to the court may seem equitable and meet in the premises. AMUSEMENTS

"This Woman and This Man," by the author of "Seven Days," will be seen here tonight. The New York Press has the following to say of star and play:

"One must feel a pleasure mingled with justice of yielding a generous measure of honest admiration to Minnie Victorson. Above all else she is an actress of splendid histrionic talent, and one who by her works and her wisdom makes for the betterment of the stage as an institution of art. She is a seeker after that which is real and beautiful and uplifting in the sphere of the drama, and when it is found she has the mental ability to portray it in its happiest and most effective form. Miss Minnie Victorson's portrayal of the young governess is nothing short of masterly. The gradual unfolding of the struggling mother's character under the sunshine of the child's love, a stimulus that causes it to broaden and develop and strengthen from that of a dreamer to that of a woman of action is delivered with speaking fidelity. Miss Minnie Victorson's marvelously flexible voice—her expressive face lighted by wonderful eyes and her natural grace of demeanor are still informed by a keen artistic insight. The restraint which marks her handling of the earlier scenes and through which one glimpses the true character of the woman makes the climax of the second act as powerful a situation as has been seen on the stage in many a month."
