Instead of the week preceding, as many of the horsemen wished to take their animals to the fair in Portland the week of September 14th. The new arrangement will give horsemen continuous dates to and including the last week of September at Roseburg.

The University of Oregon basketball team returned Sunday from its triumphant tour of the Inland Empire, having won six games and lost none. The last one was forfeited to Oregon by Pullman on account of a conflict in dates. The Pullman team had a date to play with the local Y. M. C. A. team and could not put it off for the Oregon game. The boys report good treatment wherever they played.

The student body of the University will turn out next Saturday afternoon and rebuild the covered track that was blown down by the wind some time ago. Spring track training formally began today. The cross-country runners now turn out regularly every afternoon, rain or shine. The Watts Jewelry company has offered a large silver cup for the winning team in the inter-class cross-country to be held next month.

A remarkable instance of long distance telephone use was in evidence this morning at the Eugene office when Mahlon Sweet talked to his sister in Oakland, Cal., over 500 miles away. The call went to Portland and from there direct to Oakland. Mr. Sweet was able to recognize the voice of his sister from the

first word, and the entire conversation was very distinct. He learned that his mother, who has been ill, is better.

Three men were up before Police Judge Bryson this morning on a vagrancy charge. One, a cripple by the name of Thomas Mahoney, was using abusive language Saturday afternoon at the Park hotel, and another, Jas. Clark, was intoxicated. They were each given a "23" sentence and have left the city. Frank Wooten was accused of begging on the streets. The deed for the transfer of the Coburg electric plant to the Oregon Power company, as mentioned by The Guard a few days ago, was filed for record with the county clerk this afternoon. Bucknum and wife and the grantees is the Northern Idaho and Montana Power company, the name under which the Oregon Power company holds several plants in this part of the state. The price for the plant, as given in the deed, was \$3100.

A number of wires were crossed and several broken, but not nearly as many as usually results from a wind equal to yesterday's. There were 17 complaints reported. They found that the surveyors of the big corporation ran several lines across the mountains on the summit in an effort to find a suitable crossing place, and that their surveys and those of the Pacific Great Western company conflict in a number of places. They report that the roads are in very bad condition.

MARX DRY CLEANING
