COUNCIL CREATES A MUNICIPAL WATER BOARD

E. U. Lee, M. Svarverud, C. S. Frank, R. M. Day and B. B. McKinney Members

A water board was created by the city council last night by the passage of an ordinance and the naming of E. U. Lee, M. Svarverud, C. S. Frank, R. M. Day and B. B. McKinney as members of the board. The ordinance, which had been drawn up by City Attorney Pipes, was read, and, after several amendments, was passed by all members voting yes except Councilman Dorr. He did not like the idea of the board having supervision over the power plant, as provided in the ordinance.

Provisions of the ordinance are as follows: The members of the board shall draw lots for the terms of one, two, three, four and five years, and the length of the term of each member elected, beginning with 1912, shall be five years, one to be elected each year from each of the four wards of the city and one at large. The board shall have entire control of the water plant and the power plant and to make extensions as are deemed advisable, have entire control of all the water funds and disbursements. The board shall elect a president and vice-president and is empowered to employ a secretary and such other help as may be desired. The board shall sell water and power to the public at a uniform rate to be fixed by it and shall prescribe the rules and regulations for the operation of the system. The ordinance becomes effective after the mayor's signature is affixed.

Boundary Election
Another important matter attended to by the council last night was fixing a date for the election to decide whether or not certain outlying territory shall be annexed to the city. This was voted upon nearly a year ago, but it was found that the election was void because the people residing in the territory desired to be annexed were not given a vote in the matter. The date of the election was fixed as Friday, March 24th.

The voting place for those outside the city is to be the old vinegar factory at the corner of West Second and Blair streets. The judges of the election there will be M. B. Huntley, A. W. Lewis and Willis Nicholas. The voting places inside the city are designated as follows, together with the judges of election:

First ward—Hose house on East Eleventh street, Herbert Button, W. B. Dillard and S. R. Williams. A. A. Second ward—City hall, A. A. Simmons, I. E. Stevens and R. McMurphy.

Third ward—Briggs' plumbing shop on West Seventh street, W. G. Martin, George Jennings and Jesse Isaman.

Fourth ward—Bennett building at the corner of West Ninth and Olive streets, S. M. Moran, J. G. Wells and F. W. Bloomfield.

Routine Work
The report of Plumbing Inspector Zell on the special inspection of the plumbing and sewers throughout the city was read and referred to the sewer committee.

A petition for a sidewalk on the west side of Moss avenue from Thirtieth to Eleventh streets was referred to the street committee.

F. L. Chambers' ordinance granting him a franchise to construct a spur track from the main line of the S. P. to his warehouse site on High street was passed, with the understanding that if the street committee makes an unfavorable report the mayor shall veto it. There was some question as to whether or not the side track would interfere with the Oregon Electric or any other line that would want to turn up High street from East Fifth.

Councilman Heller reported that Mr. Boqua had taken John O'Brien's place on the street force, but he had

not yet been sworn in as a police officer. The council ordered that he appear to be sworn in and receive his star.

The sum of \$4000 was transferred from the sewer fund to the general fund as a loan, to be returned when needed.

A petition for a six-foot board walk on the east side of Stewart avenue from West Fourteenth to West Seventeenth street was referred to the street committee.

E. C. Hills, city dog-catcher, reported poor success in collecting licenses for the reason that the ordinance regulating the matter says that licenses shall be collected on dogs running at large and nearly every dog owner claims that his animal is kept up, although the catcher sees many running loose. To catch them is the trouble.

Hills also reported on his recent arc light inspection trip. He said he could find only 83 lights, whereas the city is paying for 86, and many of the 83 fail to burn at times.

Councilman Moon reported that doors in sidewalks leading to basements of store buildings are often left open at night and the city attorney was ordered to draw an ordinance covering the matter.

The marshal was directed to request the light company to draw a map of the city showing the location of each arc light.

AMUSEMENTS

Just when the last obstacle has been removed, a fascinating, through desiring window, Mrs. Marvelous Wonder, appears upon the scene, claiming proprietary ownership of Lonesome Town, as the widow of the late Isaac Wattle.

And when the entanglement is so complex as to leave the audience aithering mass of laughter-worn humanity, the rightful heir, in the person of Hazy Fogg, a freckle-faced product of Lonesome Town, sweeps aside all other contestants and with biblical meekness comes into her own.

It is the funniest vehicle that Dill has had in his career and his corps of fun-makers are excellent second aides to him in his career and production of the entertainment.

DOCTORS LECTURE ON TUBERCULOSIS

Patron-Teacher Meeting at the Central School Most Interesting

The Central Patron-Teacher association met Friday afternoon. Dr. Whiteaker gave a very interesting and instructive talk upon the subject "Tuberculosis—Prevention and Cure."
