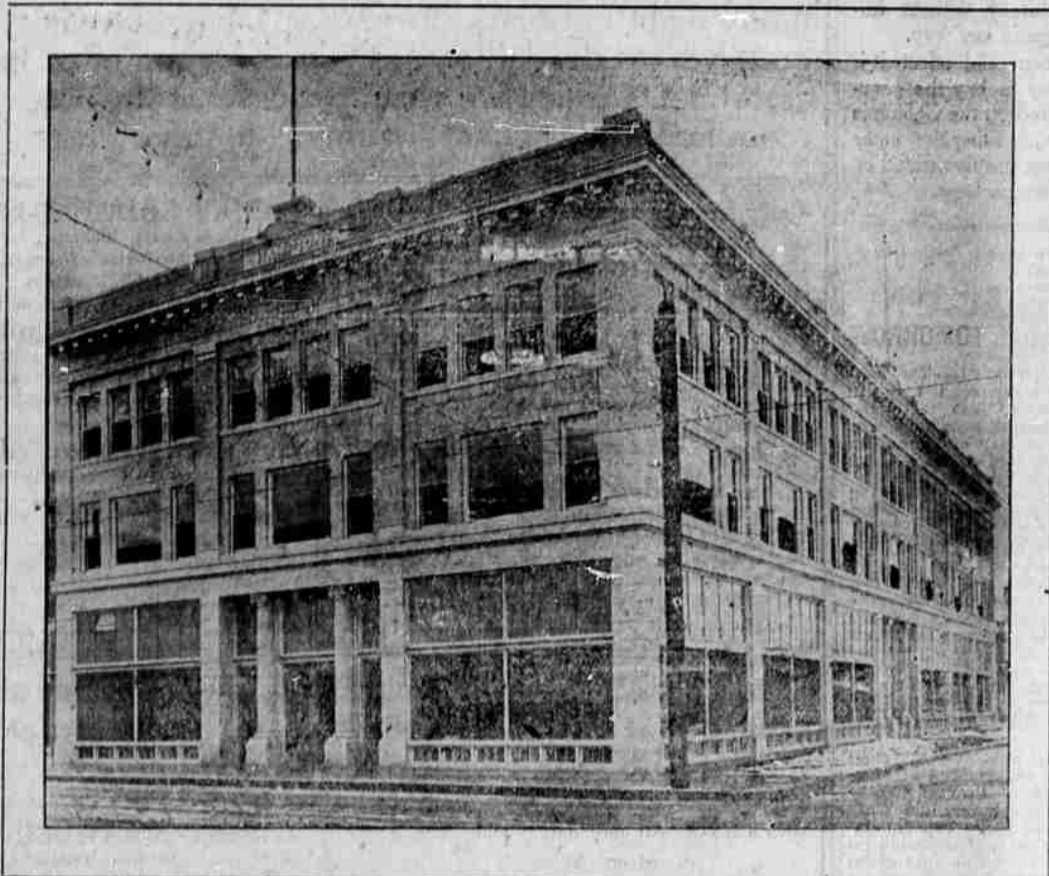

The Cottage Grove county seat boomers will not gain friends or popularity by holding up the funds of a state institution. Of course, they will be able to do it, since the referendum is very easy to invoke now and a petition can quickly be filled with names. The point is that using referendum as a weapon for spite work will not popularize this system of popular government, nor tend to improve the standing with the public of those who invoke it. They may have the satisfaction of thinking they have struck back at Eugene, but in the long run a policy of this kind reacts upon those who adopt it, and we predict that the mass meeting at Cottage Grove last night sounded the death knell of Neamith county. Eugene can get along without a larger university two years, or for all time to come, for that matter. This city has other foundations for its growth and commercial expansion; as a matter of fact, few persons here look upon the university as a commercial asset, and the idea of building a larger and better school originated, not with the people of Eugene, but was conceived by the management of the institution itself. There was no Eugene lobby at Salem during the legislature, and interest was taken in it by our commercial organizations no further than that which was naturally prompted by close association and friendliness for the school. Eugene as a community, however, recognizes the animus which inspired the action of Cottage Grove, and will accept the implied challenge for a fight to the finish in the spirit that has animated its people during the past five years. If there is ever a new county carved out of Lane and Douglas, it is safe to say that Cottage Grove will not be its county seat.

It costs money to run a daily newspaper. For example, the Inland Herald at Spokane ran \$400,000 in debt in less than a

year, and then went into a receiver's hands. Starting new papers in fields covered by old established publications, is not as popular a pastime as it once was.

Now that the legislature has adjourned, after being very considerate to the down-trodden corporations, we trust the era of railroad building will not be longer delayed.

Eugene's building record this year is going to press the 1909 limit—the largest in the city's history—very closely, and it may establish a new mark.
