WORK OVERTIME

Prolong Session of the Legislature for Four More Days

Boise, Idaho, March 6.—The 11th session of the Idaho Legislature adjourned today, after having run over the pay limit four days.

It is regarded as a liberal body. It refused to enact a state-wide prohibition law or to submit a resolution for prohibition by constitutional amendment, notwithstanding the Republican platform promised the latter.

A railway commission law, promised by the Republican platform, was also defeated. The Legislature was Republican in both branches. The direct primary law was amended by eliminating the compulsory second choice provision and providing for representative party declarations. There is some prospect of an extra session to reconsider appropriation bills.

NINETY BURNED IN PICTURE SHOW

St. Petersburg, March 6.—Ninety persons were burned to death and forty injured by a fire which destroyed a moving picture theatre at Botogie Sunday.

THIRTY INJURED IN CLEVELAND

Cleveland, March 6.—Thirty persons were injured in an early morning fire which consumed a three-story apartment house. Three may die.

NEWS AND GOSSIP FROM AFRICAN GAME IMPORTED TO AMERICA

Guard Special Service.

London, March 7.—One will have to go back twenty-six years to find a parallel to such an exciting session of Parliament as is the present one. That was when Mr. Gladstone changed his mind and came out for Home Rule. The next most exciting time was in 1903 when Joseph Chamberlain proposed to abandon free trade. The resistance to the parliament bill will be strenuous, but the measure is expected to be carried through Commons early in May, without doubt. The Lords can not depend upon the king to extricate them from their critical position. They must fight their own battle and they do not know how to meet the argument that the Parliament bill has received popular sanction and cannot be rejected.

Were it not for the condition of Mr. Lloyd George's health, the ministry could be said to be in fine fighting form. But although the Chancellor of the Exchequer is much improved, his physicians have warned Mr. Lloyd-George that his voice must not be strained by persistent use, or he may be forced to retire from public life permanently. The financial business is heavily in arrears and the Chancellor alone can extricate the treasury from the various complications and clear the ground for another instalment of the democratic politics outlined in the budget speech, and for the introduction of disability pensions and a system of insurance against unemployment.

While the government has secured fresh supplies of debating power, the opposition has failed to bring forth any new debaters, and there is a dearth of ability in the front of the opposition bench. The most serious complaint against the unionist party organization is that the safe seats are taken by men who have money rather than talent, and that ambitious men of real ability are left to contest hopeless boroughs and are kept out of parliament.

The Very Reverend William Meddant Furness, Dean of Winchester, who is revising the Ten Commandments, is said to be peopled about changing the second, fourth and the tenth commandments especially. Two of them happen to be long commandments, and his task is to suggest ways of shortening all three. He has not yet decided what to do about the second, which forbids the making of graven images, or about the fourth

in which all our Sunday laws are rooted. He proposes to shorten the tenth, which forbids us to covet our neighbor's wife, man, servant, maid, servant, ox, ass, or anything that is his, by making it read simply, "Thou shalt not covet."

Again the salary of the Lord Mayor of Dublin is giving trouble. Originally, after much discussion, it was fixed at 3,600 pounds, or about \$18,000 a year. It was reduced a few months ago on account of the distress prevailing in the city, to \$8,000. Then it was raised again, and reduced again, all within the past month. The new lord mayor declares that he will not allow public meetings, or entertainments to be held at the mansion house during his administration. He will use his own home in the suburbs in order to demonstrate that it is impossible to maintain the dignity of office on \$8,000.

Aeronautical prospects for this year are bright, in the opinion of the leading airship makers of Germany. The Zeppelin Company is preparing to launch at least three airships during the year, and will carry passengers. The latest type of plane now in course of construction by the Zeppelin Company is a small aerial cruiser for army scouting purposes. It is only 300 feet long, but it has engines equal in power to those of the Deutschland, and is more pointed in shape. There are other companies that have many contracts on hand.

Not long ago the spread of foot and mouth diseases in Sweden was attributed by an eminent authority to sea gulls and other birds, which introduced the germs of the malady from infected areas in north Germany. In upper Austria the disease prevails among the cattle, also, and a remarkable explanation has been offered for it and accepted by local authorities. It is the old recognized custom among young farm hands on isolated homesteads there to go courting the maids on other farms in the evenings, on the Romeo and Juliet plan; that is, she leans out of the window, while the swain stands just outside within reach of her hand. This "Fensterleichen," as it is locally called, is now held to be responsible for the spreading of the cattle disease through germs carried on clothes or boots from infected farms to clean ones. Alas for romance, "Fensterleichen" is forbidden on pain of fine and imprisonment.

PRISONERS SHARE PROFIT OF THEIR LABOR

New Plan in Operation in the Rhode Island Prison

Providence, R. I., March 7.—There was something resembling joy depicted on the countenances of the 400 convicts in Rhode Island state prison when they went to their allotted tasks this morning, for from this time on they will share in the profits made on their work. James F. McCusker, the new warden of the Cranston institution, is responsible for the project put into effect today.

Under the plan, the profit-sharing system is to apply to all prisoners employed in the workshops, kitchen, laundry, bakery, engineering department and such other departments as the chairman of the state board may direct. All receipts in excess of \$2,000 a month are to be used for this purpose and no part of the money thus paid to prisoners is to be used for the payment of fines or costs of court. All convicts who have been employed three months or more are entitled to share in the fund.

"Our board believes that this plan will be conducive to good discipline and be of great benefit to the men," said Chairman Walter A. Read. "Many of the men leave the prison broken in spirit and with only a suit of clothes and \$5 between them and beggary. The new system will give the prisoner a chance to save money for a fresh start in the world or to help his family, if he has any one dependent upon him."

SHEEHAN ATTACKS GOVERNOR DIX

New York, March 7.—After consultation with his Tammany supporters, William F. Sheehan issued a statement today in which he accused Governor Dix of "yielding to those who have been obstructing the election of the regularly chosen candidate of the party for United States senator."

Charles F. Murphy, the Tammany leader, said Mr. Sheehan's statement spoke for itself. He would not add to it. The belief of Tammany leaders is that Sheehan will hold 78 votes when the full effect of Governor Dix's letter has made itself felt.

The governor's attitude towards Sheehan has been no secret to Tammany for some time, and there was no expectation that it would produce any immediate result.

POSTOFFICE OFFICIAL GETS GRAND BOUNCE

Washington, March 6.—Arthur M. Travers, chief clerk to the third assistant postmaster general, was dismissed from service today by Postmaster-General Hitchcock, who, in a statement, declared that Travers was guilty of manipulating postage stamps for his own financial benefit.

THINK MAJOR KILLED FOR MONEY

Beaverton, Or., March 6.—A suspicion is entertained here that Fred Mager, whose charred remains were found buried in the ruins of his cabin near here Friday night, was murdered, and robbery was the motive. It is reported Mager had over \$10,000 in his possession.

AFRICAN GAME IMPORTED TO AMERICA

Scheme Backed By Hammond, Gifford Pinchot and Others

New York, March 7.—To restrict the United States with game, thus increasing the food supply and incidentally striking a blow at the leather trust, is the purpose of an expedition which set out for South Africa today under the leadership of Maj. Frederick Russell Burnham. Among those interested in the project of importing animals, fish and fowl to America, are said to be former Chief Forester Gifford Pinchot, John H. Hammond, and Congressman R. J. Brumfield of Louisiana.

A bill has been introduced in congress authorizing the secretary of agriculture to expend \$500,000 in the importation of wild animals, but it will not become a law this session. The men behind the project provided the funds for the preliminary expedition of Maj. Burnham. "In the semi-arid regions of Africa," explained Maj. Burnham, "there are many varieties of animals that thrive under conditions that would be impossible to the ordinary domestic animals. They can live on the rough country and are harder than goats. Their meat is excellent for food."

"For instance, the bush buck would thrive in the foothill regions and semi-arid deserts of the south-western section of the United States, and would become a source of profit. This is a browsing animal, about the size of a deer. Its flesh is of a fine flavor and its hide makes one of the best and strongest leathers known. It is commonly used by the Boers to make forelashes on their exceedingly long ox and stage whips."

"It is the purpose of my expedition to secure and bring to America some of the smaller and more useful animals, send them to one of our ranches in the west, and when they have become domesticated to distribute them throughout the country."

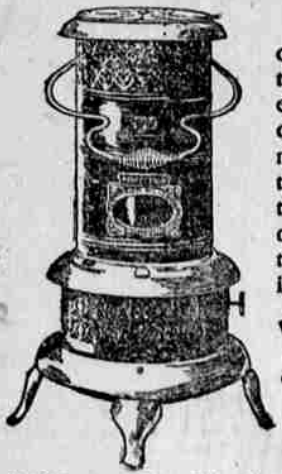
