Following is the summary of the weather conditions in Eugene for the twenty-four hours ending March 13 at 8 a. m.: Maximum temperature, 50; minimum, 28; rainfall, none; direction of wind, northwest; condition of air, clear.

The city council will meet tonight.

The Eugene water commission went to the electric plant at Watterville this morning, expecting to return this evening.

F. E. Blair, the commission merchant, today shipped from Coburg a carload of hay, which he bought from Harsh & Campbell.

The American Paving company is building the cement walk in front of the Bonnette block at the corner of West Ninth and Olive streets.

Household goods arrived in Eugene yesterday for J. C. Bigger and family and Thos. A. Jensen and family, recent arrivals from Portland.

Samples of the asphaltic pavement laid in Roseburg and Medford by Clark & Henry, have been received in Eugene and are being examined.

The sheriff's office was crowded with people today paying their taxes. Tomorrow is the last day upon which the three per cent rebate will be allowed.

Eugene people have been started by the site of their Newport assessments. Lots 45 by 50 with cheap cottages, are assessed as high as \$900.

Gilbert Tyson, manager of the Hampton store at Cottage Grove, who has been very ill in one of the hospitals here, is able to be out on the streets.
