TWO GOOD REALTY DEALS JUST MADE IN SPRINGFIELD

**E. Wells Buys Ten Acres from
N. A. Rowe and Sells Main
Street Property**

Springfield, March 13.—Two important real estate deals took place here Saturday. N. A. Rowe sold 10 acres of land two miles from Springfield to E. Wells, a shoemaker, for \$3500. This price of \$350 an acre approaches a record breaker for this section of the country. The land however is under cultivation and on a county road. The other sale was that of the sale of 17 feet of Main street property by Mr. Wells to Bud McPherson for \$1700. This sale is a high price for Main street frontage. The property is that on which the Wells shoe shop is located, across from the Sutton block, on Fifth street. Mr. Wells will give up his shoe-making business and begin farming. Mr. Rowe on the other hand will leave the farm and open a business office in Springfield. He has rented the old Rivett building on Fifth street.

ROAD WILL BE BUILT TO SPRINGFIELD PARK

**Ten Teams and Crew of Men
Will Begin Work at
Crusher Today**

Guard Special Service.
Springfield, March 13.—Ten teams and a crew of men will be placed at work at the city rock crusher today and will begin the construction of a road about the city park on Willamette heights, that was donated last year by the Springfield Realty company. The donation was made on the condition that at least \$500 is spent in improvement before June 1. The road will be the first improvement.

An effort is being made to have a reservoir constructed at the top of Willamette heights to supply the city with water. Located here, it would not only provide water for the city park and also Emerald Heights across the city, but it would provide a water pressure of over 130 pounds which would give a most efficient fire protection.

The joists of the first floor of the Perkins & Stevens block were laid this morning, and brick work starts next week. Brick work will also begin next week upon the addition to the Rivett building occupied by E. E. Morrison & Co.
