REAL ESTATE SALES ARE MORE FREQUENT

Springfield Brokers Are Becoming More Active as Spring Advances

Guard Special Service. Springfield, March 21.—With the coming of spring, the real estate men have been crawling out of their winter places of hibernation and others are beginning to look truly active in the dirt line. Already they are telling their prospective customers that they are planning a general raise of prices during the next ten days, and they are having their lands put in the well-drawn blueprints. Among the transactions taking place yesterday, Rhodes & Sutton report the following: The Fred Rich property on Third and A streets between Third and Fourth, including a house and lot, was sold for \$1600 to J. N. Palmer and wife. A man named Chan, living in the county near Springfield, purchased the G. A. York property in Stewart addition, and C. R. Hastings sold his property on north D street to R. B. Richardson for \$1400.

MAYOR SUTTON SIGNS GAS FRANCHISE

Guard Special Service. Springfield, March 21.—Mayor Sutton yesterday signed the gas franchise, and if the company desires to accept it, which is probable, ditch digging upon the system will begin in but a few weeks. Already the gas company has two carloads of pipe in Springfield for the line. The plans show the system here to be extensive. There will be six parallel main lines between Mill and Ninth streets, and these will be connected at Mill, Ninth and Fifth streets. Every other parallel line will be a four-inch main, while the intermediate pipes will be two inches. Most of the pipes will go in the alleys. This will provide a system that will bring gas within a block of every house in the gas district. The pipe line from Eugene will cross the river on the street bridge. The service will be a high pressure system and features are included at every connection.

PAT SULLIVAN IN DURANCE VILE

MORE SEWERS WANTED IN SOUTHEASTERN PART OF THE CITY

A petition signed by over a hundred property owners in the southeastern part of the city was recently circulated, asking the council to provide more sewers for that district. It was intended to present it to the council in time, if possible, so that the voters might have a voice in the matter, but it is now too late to submit it at the election on April 3rd. The petition reads as follows: "To the city council of Eugene: Referring to your recent ordinance providing for two large trunk sewers, the bonds for these to be voted upon by the citizens of Eugene in April, we, the undersigned citizens of the southeastern part of Eugene, residing between 12th and 18th streets and between Alder and Willamette streets, respectfully petition the city council of Eugene to include the southeastern part of Eugene in the contemplated construction of a large trunk sewer, continuing to the west limits of the city and emptying into the river below town, the exact location of the whole to be determined by experts, but to be as central as possible to benefit the largest number of residents. "The sewers as at present constructed on East 13th, 14th streets, etc., are inadequate, owing to their small size and lack of fall, and get badly congested after a few hours of rain, causing toilets to overflow and

thus imperilling the health of the community."
