ACTIVITY AGAIN ON
NATRON EXTENSION

Guard Special Service.
Springfield, April 3.—Operations on the Natron extension have again become active and carloads of men are being shipped through Springfield daily. Perkins & Mather, whole sale butchers of Springfield, are now supplying 16 head of cattle a week in the form of dressed meat, to feed the army of men that are at work. The principal activity is eight miles above Lowell, which point the track-layers have reached. Every effort is being made to rush this work toward the end of the present contract. The base of supplies will be established at the end of the 31-mile track from Natron and all work will proceed from there. The cost of freightage food into the mountains would be excessive unless the base of supplies can be made at the foot of the work.

BRANCHING OUT

Springfield, April 3.—E. E. Morrison & Co., local furniture and hardware dealers, have branched out in a new line, that of handling implements and vehicles. It is the first such stock established in Springfield and will make the city more of a trade center for the neighboring farmers. Foster, the Eugene implement and harness man, located on West Fifth street. Morrison & Co. have grown very rapidly during the past year, branching from a small second-hand store to the present condition of a complete hardware store. DEMAND FOR HOUSES
TO RENT IS GREAT

Springfield, April 3.—In spite of the fact the more houses are being built in Springfield today than ever before, the city is experiencing a house famine. Brokers report that the demand for houses are far in excess of the supply and whenever a house is made vacant a dozen are after it. Contractors declare that there has never been as much building in Springfield as there is today. It is estimated that no less than 25 houses are now under construction. Furthermore, there are several very high-grade residences among this number.

SEAVEY AND ROWE BUY
REAL ESTATE BUSINESS

Springfield, April 3.—Jesse Seavey and Nathan Rowe, both of whom recently sold their farms and moved to the city, have purchased the Fry real estate business at the corner of Seventh and Main streets. Two pieces of Main street frontage were purchased by these gentlemen at good figures, considering the locations. The Fry frontage of 31 feet was purchased at a price of \$45 a front foot, while the same number of feet in a lot opposite the Sutton block, adjoining the corner lot, was purchased for \$100 a front foot.

THREE-STORY BRICK
BLOCK IN PROSPECT

Springfield, April 3.—Springfield will have a three-story white pressed brick block where the Perkins and Stevens building is being erected. If the present plans of the builders materialize, it is proposed to add a third story to accommodate Masons, who have offered to rent such quarters. It will be Springfield's first three story building and will be an imposing structure of white brick with a frontage of 70 feet.

TOP OF HILL IN
AN AUTOMOBILE

Springfield, April 3.—Jesse Seavey was the first to climb the hill near Springfield along the new boulevard on Willamette Heights in an automobile. The earth is still soft and the climb was of merit. He was watched by several hundred from Main street below. There is some speculation in Springfield as to whether Superintendent Frank Barker who is constructing the new boulevard, will be able to take the heavy gasoline road roller over the hill to roll the road on top, as he declares he will.
