Will be Staged by University Girls at Theatre This Evening

The most elaborate event ever attempted by the University school of music will be a comic opera given by 40 of the prettiest women and best singers and dancers in the University, this evening, at the Eugene theatre. The affair, which will be the result of months of training, is to be entirely on the plan of a real commercial comic opera, and the dancing, singing and costumes will actually excel the average theater production. The scene of the opera is laid in Japan and the costumes are very elaborate. Many are real Japanese costumes and have been imported from Portland and California points, where they have been borrowed from friends or customers. Special scenery has been painted by Portland artists. A 10-piece orchestra will play the score. Rehearsals point to a very successful performance. The advance demand for seats indicates that the capacity of the theater will be taxed.

They are Edwina Prosser and Meta Goldsmith, Eugene; Effie Rhodes, Ruby Hammerstrom and Maud Mastie, Portland, and Maud Guthrie, Eugene. There are eight maids-of-honor and sprites, couriers and attendants.
