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OREGON UNIVERSITY

The Portland Daily Journal says: "Many of the state papers strongly oppose the referendum on the University appropriation. They take the broad view that Oregon of all states should accentuate education along all lines. "Oregon is carrying on government in unexplored fields. It has clothed the citizen with new powers and new responsibilities. The state as well as popular government is on trial with the world for an audience. "Government is what the man makes it. There is no system that can be successful without the man. The new powers and responsibilities placed upon the man in Oregon require the most that can be given in education. The Oregon citizen requires a mental horizon and balance beyond that in states where the powers of government are less widely diffused. "In this state there should be sustenance and strength for every vehicle of education. The graduates of universities and colleges are everywhere leaders for education of every kind. The man who has drunk at the fountain of knowledge is always a live wire in the movement for spreading knowledge to all. "Oregon should be the last state on the face of the globe to

throw a straw in the way of higher education. Can we afford to let the world believe as a result of our action, that popular government means hostility to liberal education?

GREAT DEMAND FOR GAS STOVES

Extension of Gas Mains Makes Many New Consumers

GEORGE BAKER SAYS WIFE KEEPS COMPANY WITH ANOTHER MAN

Seeks Divorce from His Wife, Stella, Charging Cruelty

Alleging that she went to Springfield with another man and did not return home until 5 o'clock in the morning, George Baker has begun suit in the circuit court against his wife, Stella, for divorce on the ground of cruel and inhuman treatment. According to his complaint, which was filed yesterday afternoon, they were married in Eugene on June 22, 1908, and have no children. He says that his wife has been cross and has neglected him and her home, being frequently seen in the company of one Frank Aver, with whom, the plaintiff alleges, she went to Springfield and stayed until morning. He says this occurred several times. On account of these actions on her part, he says that he was compelled to and did leave her on April 1, 1911. L. R. Edmunson and C. M. Kiesinger are attorneys for Baker in the case.
