O.E. GETS TERMINAL FACILITIES AT M' MINNVILLE

Secured Property in Business District of City for Depot Grounds

Portland, April 20.—Terminal facilities for the Oregon Electric Railway have been secured in McMinville, to which place a branch line from the main road running south from Portland will be built, although definite arrangements for the work have not yet been made.

It is not likely that the McMinville branch will be constructed in 1911, but the chances are bright for its completion before the end of 1912. This is one of the projects which John F. Stevens outlined when he first came to Oregon and his plans always have included the building of the road. Had he not resigned his position at the head of the Hill lines in Oregon, he would probably have taken up the work making this extension as soon as those proposed for the immediate future are completed. Even now he hopes that the line eventually will be built and placed in operation.

Surveys Are Completed
Surveys for the road have been completed and although no definite time for building the branch has been provided, arrangements for making it a part of the Hill system in this state are proceeding quietly with the end that when construction work actually starts there will be nothing to prevent it from being completed in a short period.

The proposed route as surveyed connects with the main line of the Oregon Electric between Portland and Salem at Tigard, which is just a few miles south of Garden Home, the junction of the Forest Grove branch.

In anticipation of the entrance of the Oregon Electric the citizens of McMinville are making preparations for the consequent increase in business. They have arranged to pave 60 blocks of streets during the coming summer. Nearly all the business district streets will be converted to hard surface and some of the principal residence thoroughfares will be treated similarly. Half a dozen new business blocks have been started or projected as a result of the proposed operations of the Oregon Electric.

Hogan is already in first class condition and believes that he will win.

CLARENCE DeMAR WINS MARATHON RACE

Boston, April 20.—Clarence De Mar, of Dorchester, who finished second last year, was the winner of yesterday's Marathon race from Highland, Mass., to Boston, a distance of 26 miles. Unofficial time, 2:21:39.25, breaking the record of 2:24:24, made four years ago by Tom Longboat, the Canadian Indian. More than 100,000 people gathered and watched the runners enter Boston.

The field got away in good order at noon. Thieron led at Wollsey Square, 12 miles from the start, by 30 yards. The time here was 1 hour

5 minutes and 20 seconds, compared with the record of 55 minutes 14 seconds by Weldon in 1908.
