

EVACUATION OF JUAREZ IS PRICE OF ARMISTICE PRESIDENT DIAZ MUST PAY

El Paso, April 21.—If the Mexican government would avoid international complications, it must order General Navarro to evacuate Juarez at once. This ultimatum was sent by General Francisco I. Madero, jr., to Dr. Vasquez Gomez at Washington today, to be communicated to the Mexican government.

General Madero has taken the position that the evacuation of Juarez is essential before he will consider an armistice, and it is possible the attack on the city will be postponed until a reply is received from the Mexican government.

BRITISH COLUMBIA TEACH ALL BOYS TO SWIM IS PLAN OF Y. M. C. A.

Plaintiffs Get the Money and Defendants Get the Land Athletic Director Wood Invites All, Whether Members or Not, to Learn

"We intend to teach every boy in Eugene to swim this summer," was the declaration of Athletic Director Wood of the city Y. M. C. A. today. It is the plan of the Y. M. C. A. to extend the use of its swimming tank to every youngster in the city, whether a member of the association or not, for at least two lessons free, and in this way it is hoped to prevent all drowning accidents this summer.

PRUNE CROP NOT DAMAGED BY FROST

Salem, Or., April 21.—That the damage done to the prune crop all over the state is practically nothing, is the opinion of W. C. Tillson, after receiving reports from all parts of the state.

While not directly interested in other fruit crops, Mr. Tillson has reports indicating that cherries, peaches and pears have been somewhat damaged by the frost, but even with these fruits he believes that no great damage has been done.

Mr. Tillson has received a circular letter from Rosenberg, the biggest prune dealer of California, in which that authority estimates the California crop at 185,000,000 pounds for this year, as against 89,000,000 last year.

Discussing these figures, Mr. Tillson said: "The Oregon crop will safely aggregate 29,000,000, and that will make 209,000,000 as a total."
