New York, April 22.—Clear and fair weather may be expected to prevail in the central and northwestern sections of the country during the early part of next week. In the New England and middle Atlantic states, and also in the far west, and south, unsettled weather is indicated. During the middle part of the week it will be unusually warm except in the North Atlantic and Appalachian mountain regions, where cloudy weather will probably prevail. On Friday and Saturday high winds will arise in the southwest, and strong gales may be expected over the Great Lakes and North Atlantic, with rains in the south and central west.
